To His Excellency, ELLIOTT W. MAJOR, Governor of Missouri:

The Third Annual Report of the Public Service Commission for the year ending December 31, 1915, is herewith submitted.

At the close of the year, December 31, 1915, there were 1084 corporations, municipalities and individuals engaged in serving the public in this State in some capacity that, by operation of the Public Service Commission Law, placed them under the supervision and jurisdiction of the Commission. GENERAL OFFICE.

The number of sessions of the Commission during the calendar year 1915, the full Commission sitting, was 192, and held on as many different days. In addition to this number there have been held by one or more Commissioners either at the office of the Commission or at some other place in the State, where the complaint or application originated, 72 sessions, it being the policy of the Commission, as far as practicable and their appropriation for expenses permitting, to hear all matters presented at the place most convenient and at least expense to the parties.

Usually and almost without exception, the full Commission hears arguments and reads the briefs, if any there be, even though the case may have been heard by only one Commissioner.

SPECIAL AUTHORITIES.

The law prescribing the duties and fixing the powers of the Commission provides, among other things, that all tariffs and schedules or rules governing them shall be filed with the Commission thirty days before they become effective, but it is found

that in many cases the changes sought to be made result in a decrease in rates or the adoption of a rule greatly to the advantage and convenience of all persons concerned, so that it has been found to be important, entirely appropriate and practical, both to the public and the utility, to issue a special authority at once permitting the filing to become effective on a date less than thirty days from the filing date, the same to be ratified and approved by the Commission at a later date.

FORMAL COMPLAINTS AND APPLICATIONS.

During the year 1915, the period covered by this report, 262 formal complaints and applications were filed, of which number 167 have been disposed of, leaving 95 still pending, which latter number of cases are held either awaiting the filing of papers required by the rules of the Commission, the completion by the Commission's engineers of valuation of physical properties, the auditing of books, the filing of briefs, the date for arguments, etc.

INFORMAL COMPLAINTS.

During the year 1915, 481 informal complaints were filed, of which 419 have been concluded by correspondence. The remaining 62 are still pending, some of which may fail of adjustment by correspondence or personal interview, in which event on the filing of proper papers they will become formal and be closed by order of the Commission after a formal hearing.

LEGAL DEPARTMENT.

This department consists of the general counsel to the Commission; an assistant counsel; and one stenographer.

The Missouri Railroad Cases in U. S. Supreme Court: At the date of the First Annual Report of this Commission there were pending in the United States District Court at

Kansas City motions in each of the cases which had been instituted by thirteen railroad companies of this State restraining the enforcement of the statutes fixing maximum freight and passenger rates, asking the said court to enter decrees in accordance with the mandates of the Supreme Court of the United States in said cases, directing that the decrees of the trial court be reversed and that the bills of the complainants be dismissed without prejudice. There were also pending in said court motions in said cases filed by the General Counsel to this Commission for the taxation of costs which had been theretofore paid by the State in said cases, and which resulted in the taxation of costs against the railroad companies in the sum of \$28,421.93, which sum has been paid into the State treasury. The United States District Court, on December 20, 1913, delivered an opinion on the motions as filed, asking for decrees, holding that in accordance with mandates of the United States Supreme Court decrees should be entered dismissing the bills of the complainant railroad companies without prejudice in each of the thirteen cases. The decrees were, however, not entered in accordance with the opinion, and on application of the railroad companies the court gave the matter further consideration, and on January 30, 1914, delivered a supplemental opinion, holding that under the mandates of the United States Supreme Court the District Court had no discretion and was required to dismiss the bills of complainants without prejudice, but that the court had power to retain jurisdiction on the cases for the purpose of considering ancillary questions arising as a result of the suit, and further held that a master should be appointed for the purpose of hearing and determining the claims of shippers and passengers who had paid rates and fares in excess of the amounts fixed by statute while the injunctions were in force, and that persons claiming such overcharges could be heard by the master or in any court they might elect. (210 Fed. Rep. 902.) Decrees were entered in accordance with the opinion in the thirteen cases, and the complainants took an appeal in each of said cases from the decrees so entered to the Supreme Court of the United States, which appeals were dismissed December 3, 1915.

Missouri Southern Case: The Missouri Southern Railroad Company, a corporation engaged in owning and operating a line of steam railroad in this State more than forty-five miles in length, on the 1st day of July, 1913, filed with the Pub-

lic Service Commission a complaint in writing, Case No. 52, stating that the rates being charged by it were the maximum rates as fixed by the statutes of this State and that said rates were confiscatory, and asking that the Public Service Commission make an order authorizing said railroad company to charge rates and fares in excess of those fixed by the statutes.

The Commission, on April 29, 1914, by an order made and entered of record, refused to hear the complaint and dismissed the same upon the ground that the Commission had no authority or power to authorize an increase in the rates above the maximum prescribed by the statutes of this State. Thereupon, the Missouri Southern Railroad Company applied to the Supreme Court of Missouri for a writ of mandamus to compel the Public Service Commission to hear its said complaint. The case was heard before the Supreme Court en banc in May, 1914. Counsel to the Public Service Commission filed a brief and made an argument in behalf of the Commission. The case was decided by the Supreme Court in July thereafter. The court held the Public Service Commission, under section 47 and other sections of the Public Service Commission Law, had authority to authorize an increase in rates and charges by railroad companies above the rates and charges named as maximum charges by the statutes of this State, and that a writ of mandamus should issue requiring the Public Service Commission to hear the complaint of the Missouri Southern Railroad Company. *State of Missouri ex rel. Missouri Southern Railroad Company v. Public Service Commission*, 168 S. W. 1156. Hearing of the testimony before the Commission has been completed and a decision and order fixing rates was made November 10, 1915.

Johnson Case: *B. Johnson & Son v. Jas. W. Lusk et al., Receivers of the St. Louis & San Francisco Railroad Company*, Case No. 120.

On the 15th day of January, 1914, the Public Service Commission made an order requiring the receivers of said railroad company to charge maximum rates as prescribed by the statutes of this State for the carriage of railroad ties from certain points in Missouri to Commerce, Mo., in lieu of the interstate rates which the said receivers had been charging for said shipments of railroad ties. It was held by the Commission that the shipments in question were movements in intrastate commerce, and that the statutory rates therefor should apply.

The receivers of the St. Louis & San Francisco Railroad Company thereafter procured from the Circuit Court of the City of St. Louis a writ of review in the above cause. In obedience thereto the Public Service Commission certified the full record of all the evidence and proceedings had before it in said cause to the Circuit Court of the City of St. Louis. Thereafter, on February 27, 1914, the cause was tried before the Circuit Court of the City of St. Louis (Hon. Rhodes E. Cave, Judge), and taken under advisement. Thereafter, at the April term of said court, said court affirmed the order of the Public Service Commission. Thereupon, the receivers of the St. Louis & San Francisco Railroad Company were granted an appeal to the Supreme Court of Missouri. The case was heard by the Supreme Court of Missouri en banc on October 27, 1914, and again briefed and argued in the Supreme Court and finally submitted at the October Term, 1915, and has not yet been decided.

Board of Trade Case: The Board of Trade of Kansas City, Mo., made complaint to the Commission against the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railway Company; Chicago & Alton Railroad Company; Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad Company; Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway Company; Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific Railroad Company; Kansas City Southern Railway Company; Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railway Company; Missouri Pacific Railway Company; St. Louis & San Francisco Railroad Company, Thos. H. West, Wm. B. Biddle and W. C. Nixon, Receivers; and Wabash Railroad Company, Frederic A. Delano, William K. Bixby and Edward B. Pryor, Receivers, Case No. 99, alleging, among other things, that said railway companies were charging interstate rates upon shipments of grain from points within this State to Kansas City, Mo; that the movements in question were intrastate shipments and that the intrastate rate therefor should apply. This Commission so held, by an order made and entered of record on June 29, 1914. In obedience to a writ of review issued by the Circuit Court of Jackson County a full and complete record of the proceedings had in said case was transmitted to the said court. The decision and order of the Commission was affirmed by the Circuit Court on July 10, 1915, and the case appealed to the Supreme Court of this State, where it is now pending.

Team Track Storage Cases: Cases Nos. 113, 129, 133, 134, 149, 150 and 174. In October, 1913, the following rail-

roads: Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railway Company; Missouri Pacific Railway Company and St. Louis, Iron Mountain & Southern Railway Company; Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railway Company; St. Louis & San Francisco Railroad Company; Kansas City Southern Railway Company; Western Trunk Line; Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad Company, filed tariffs with this Commission providing for team track storage charges. The charges were suspended by the Commission and a hearing was held before the Commission at Jefferson City. Thereafter, on June 23, 1914, the Commission made an order requiring that said charges be cancelled on or before July 1, 1914. Thereafter, the Kansas City Southern Railway Company procured a writ of review from the Circuit Court of Cole County in said cause; and the cause was heard and submitted to the Circuit Court of Cole County for decision on September 17, 1914. Thereafter, on November 16, 1914, said Circuit Court entered an order affirming the order of the Public Service Commission in said cause. Thereupon, the Kansas City Southern Railway Company was granted an appeal to the Supreme Court of this State where the decision of the Circuit Court was affirmed at the April Term, 1915.

Macon Bridge Case: The City of Macon filed a complaint against the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad Company before the Public Service Commission, Case No. 317, for the purpose of obtaining an order of the Commission requiring the said railroad company to maintain and repair certain overhead bridges at street crossings in the City of Macon at the cost of the railroad company. It was held by the Commission, June 29, 1914, that the Commission had authority to apportion the costs for repair and maintenance of certain overhead bridges between the City of Macon and the railroad company, and the complaint was dismissed without prejudice. Thereupon, the City of Macon procured a writ of review from the Circuit Court of Cole County. The case was heard by the Circuit Court of Cole County on October 13, 1914, and taken under advisement. Thereafter, on November 16, said Circuit Court entered an order affirming the order of the Public Service Commission in said cause. Thereupon, the City of Macon was granted an appeal to the Supreme Court of this State, where the decision of the Circuit Court was affirmed on November 29, 1915.

Macon Interchange Track Case: The City of Macon filed a complaint against the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad

Company and the Receivers of the Wabash Railroad Company, Case No. 190, for the purpose of procuring an order of this Commission requiring that said railroad companies make an interchange track at Macon, the construction of which interchange track was, after a hearing, duly ordered by this Commission. Thereafter, on July 9, 1914, the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad Company procured a writ of review from the Circuit Court of Cole County in said cause. The decision of the Commission was affirmed by the Circuit Court on January 21, 1915, and the decision of the Circuit Court was reversed by the Supreme Court of the State on December 8, 1915.

Webb City Water Case: W. V. K. Spencer et al., complainants, v. Missouri Public Utilities Company, defendant, Case No. 259.

W. V. K. Spencer et al. filed a complaint before the Public Service Commission against the Missouri Public Utilities Company seeking to enforce certain franchise provisions and rates for water service at Webb City. The Commission made an order therein on July 31, 1914, whereupon the Missouri Public Utilities Company procured a writ of review from the Circuit Court of Jasper County, and in obedience thereto a full transcript of the record and proceedings before this Commission was forwarded to the Clerk of the Circuit Court at Joplin on October 14, 1914. Thereafter, the decision and order of the Commission was affirmed by the Circuit Court on July 10, 1915, and the case appealed by the Missouri Public Utilities Company to the Supreme Court of the State, where it is now pending.

Kirksville Light Rate Case: On July 10, 1913, S. W. Weaver et al. filed complaint against the Kirksville Light, Power and Ice Company, Case No. 58, alleging that the rates charged by it for electric service were unreasonably high, etc. A hearing was duly had and the Commission on June 23, 1914, made and entered of record an order reducing rates for electric service at Kirksville. Thereafter, said Kirksville Electric Light, Power and Ice Company procured a writ of review from the Circuit Court of Adair County in said cause. The said cause was argued and submitted to said court for decision on December 1, 1914, and has since been settled and adjusted satisfactorily to all parties.

Springfield Light Rate Case: Upon complaint of McGregor-Noe Hardware Company et al. against Springfield Gas

and Electric Company and Springfield Traction Company, Case No. 15, the Commission on June 23, 1914, made an order fixing the maximum rates for electric service to be furnished by said company at Springfield. The Springfield Gas and Electric Company filed a schedule of its rates with this Commission in compliance with said order, and in November, thereafter, filed a petition in the United States District Court at Springfield for the purpose of procuring an injunction against the enforcement of the order of this Commission in said cause. Application for temporary injunction was argued December 29, 1914, and re-argued April 3, 1915, by the counsel to the Commission. Temporary injunction was granted July 7, 1915, and the case on the merits will now be heard.

Missouri Valley Realty Company Case: In the case of Missouri Valley Realty Company, complainant, v. Cupples Station Light, Heat and Power Company and Phoenix Light, Heat and Power Company, defendants, and Union Electric Light and Power Company, intervener, Case No. 269, the above-named complainant procured a writ of review from the Circuit Court of the City of St. Louis for the purpose of reviewing the order of this Commission made in said cause on October 12, 1914. The decision and order of the Commission was affirmed by the Circuit Court in March, 1915, and the cause appealed to the Supreme Court, where it is now pending.

Other Cases Pending in Federal Courts: Suits are now pending in the United States District Court at Kansas City restraining the enforcement of orders made by the Board of Railroad and Warehouse Commissioners of this State as follows: Case No. 3465, Missouri Pacific Railway Company et al. v. Co. v. H. R. Oglesby et al., Callao Train Service Case; Case No. 3884, Chicago, Burlington & Quincy R. R. Co. v. H. R. Oglesby et al., Unionville Train Service Case; Case No. 10, Chicago, Burlington & Quincy R. R. Co. v. John A. Knott et al., Tarkio Valley Branch Train Service Case. Negotiations are pending for an adjustment of these cases and they will be either settled or tried at an early date.

Columbia Gas Case: Cases Nos. 257 and 465; styled in the Circuit Court of Cole County as State of Missouri ex rel. Watts Engineering Company, relator, v. Public Service Commission, respondent. A proceeding to review an order of the Commission valuing the property of the gas company and fixing gas rates at Columbia, Missouri. Decided by the Circuit Court of Cole County in favor of the Commission on August 17, 1915, and thereupon appealed by the gas company to the Supreme Court of the State.

Columbia Telephone Case: Cases Nos. 69 and 282; styled in the Circuit Court of Cole County as State of Missouri ex rel. Columbia Telephone Company v. Public Service Commission. A proceeding to review in the courts an order of the Commission valuing the property of the telephone company and fixing telephone rates in the City of Columbia, Missouri. The decision and order of the Commission were affirmed by the Circuit Court of Cole County on December 4, 1915, and the case was thereupon appealed by the telephone company to the Supreme Court of the State, where it is now pending.

Macon Depot Case: Case No. 191; styled in the Circuit Court of Macon County as State ex rel. Wabash Railroad Co. et al. v. Public Service Commission. A proceeding to re-

view in the Circuit Court of Macon County an order of the Commission requiring the Wabash Railroad Company to construct a new station at Macon, Missouri. The order of the Commission was affirmed by the Circuit Court of Macon County, August, 1915, and an appeal taken by the Wabash Railroad Company to the Supreme Court of the State, where the case is now pending.

Union Pacific Fee Case: Case No. 490; styled in the Circuit Court of Cole County as State ex rel. Union Pacific R. R. Co. v. Public Service Commission. A proceeding to review in the courts an order of the Commission assessing fees in the sum of \$10,962.25, in favor of the State under the Public Service Commission Law for the approval by the Commission of a bond issue by the Union Pacific Railroad Company in the sum of \$31,848,900.00; argued and submitted in the Circuit Court of Cole County, June 29, 1915. The decision and order of the Commission was reversed by the Circuit Court on November 19, 1915, and thereupon the case was appealed by the Commission to the Supreme Court of the State, where it is now pending.

Charleston Light Case: Cases Nos. 105 and 283; styled in the Circuit Court of Mississippi County as State ex rel. Missouri Public Utilities Company v. Public Service Commission. A proceeding to review in the courts certain orders of the Commission fixing the valuation of the electric light company and electric light rates at Charleston, Missouri. Application by complainant for suspension of the orders of the Commission pending the litigation was denied by the Circuit Court on August 31, 1915.

Chillicothe Viaduct Case: Case No. 478; styled in the Circuit Court of Cole County as State ex rel. Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Ry. Co. v. Public Service Commission. A proceeding to review in the courts an order of the Commission requiring the construction of a viaduct by the railroad company at Chillicothe; record transmitted from the Commission to the Circuit Court July 9, 1915, where the case is now pending.

United Railways Extension Case: Cases Nos. 345 and 355; styled in the Circuit Court of the City of St. Louis as State ex rel. United Railways Company v. Public Service Commission. A proceeding to review in the courts the power of the Commission to require the railways company to apply for new franchises and construct extensions in the City of St. Louis; record before the Commission transmitted to the Circuit

Court, August 10, 1915. The case was argued and submitted on October 13, 1915, in the Circuit Court, where it is now pending.

Caruthersville Train Case: Case No. 577; styled in the Circuit Court of Cole County as State ex rel. St. Louis & San Francisco Railroad Company v. Public Service Commission. A proceeding to review in the courts an order of the Commission relating to train service at Caruthersville; record transmitted to the Circuit Court August 25, 1915. The order of the Commission was affirmed by the Circuit Court on November 15, 1915, and the case thereupon appealed by the railroad company to the Supreme Court of the State, where it is now pending.

Kansas City Stock Yards Case: Case No. 386; styled in the Circuit Court of Cole County as State ex rel. Missouri Pacific Railway Company et al. v. Public Service Commission. A proceeding to review in the courts an order of the Commission issuing a certificate of public convenience and necessity for the construction of a connecting railway and the rebuilding of stockyards at Kansas City, Missouri. The case was argued and submitted in the Circuit Court of Cole County, September 4, 1915, and the order of the Commission was affirmed by the Circuit Court on September 21, 1915. Thereupon the railroad companies appealed the case to the Supreme Court of the State, where it is now pending.

Kansas City Crossing Case: Case No. 271; styled in the Circuit Court at Independence, Missouri, as State ex rel. Missouri Pacific Railway Co. et al. v. Public Service Commission et al. A proceeding to review in the courts the power of the Commission to abolish grade crossings in Kansas City. The case was heard in October, 1915, in the Circuit Court at Independence, Missouri, where it is now pending.

Commutation Rate Case: Cases Nos. 19 and 179; styled in the Federal Court at Kansas City, Missouri, as Kansas City, Clay County & St. Joseph R. R. Co. v. Public Service Commission et al. A proceeding to enjoin in the Federal Court an order of the Commission fixing the valuation of property and ordering in commutation rates on the Kansas City, Clay County & St. Joseph R. R. Co. A motion for temporary injunction was argued before three Federal Judges on January 22, 1915, and a temporary injunction was issued in June, 1915. The case on the merits will be tried in the Federal Court in due course of procedure.

General Rate Cases Before the Commission: Cases No. 492, inclusive, to No. 505, inclusive. On September 15, 1914, applications, alike in form and allegation, praying an increase in intrastate passenger, baggage and freight rates were filed with the Commission by fourteen carriers, viz; The Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railway Company; Chicago & Alton Railroad Company; Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad Company; Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railway Company; John Scullin, Jesse McDonald and W. S. Holt, Receivers of the railroad and property of the Missouri & North Arkansas Railway Company; Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway Company; Kansas City Southern Railway Company; St. Louis Southwestern Railway Company; Edward B. Pryor, Receiver of the railroad and property of the Wabash Railroad Company; Iowa & St. Louis Railway Company; Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific Railway Company; Quincy, Omaha & Kansas City Railway Company; Missouri Pacific Railway Company and St. Louis, Iron Mountain & Southern Railway Company; and James W. Lusk, William C. Nixon and William B. Biddle, Receivers of the railroad and property of the St. Louis & San Francisco Railroad Company. Afterwards, on motion of the Quincy, Omaha & Kansas City Railway Company and John Scullin, Jesse McDonald and W. S. Holt, Receivers of the railroad and property of the Missouri & North Arkansas Railway Company, the applications of these two roads were dismissed, leaving the remaining twelve railroads to be affected by the orders of the Commission in such rate cases. The twelve applications were consolidated and heard and determined together by the Commission, and witnesses were examined and evidence heard by the Commission in behalf of the applicants and also in behalf of the Commission, shippers, passengers and the public, at hearings held at Jefferson City and other points in the State, at which hearings the counsel for the Commission appeared and offered evidence on behalf of the Commission and also filed briefs and argued the cases on behalf of the Commission. The taking of evidence extended from December 2, 1914, to June 18, 1915, and on November 10, 1915, the Commission handed down its decision and order fixing maximum passenger, baggage and freight rates to be thereafter charged by the twelve carriers, parties to the proceeding. Applications for rehearing were filed by the twelve carriers, and also by M. E. Rhodes, on behalf of himself and other passengers and shippers, and by others.

Kansas Natural Gas Case: A suit by John M. Landon et al., Receivers of the Kansas Natural Gas Company, v. The Public Utilities Commission of Kansas, The Public Service Commission of Missouri, St. Joseph, Weston, Kansas City, Deerfield, Nevada, Carl Junction, Oronogo and Joplin, Missouri, et al. in the United States District Court at Topeka, Kansas, to enjoin the defendants from interfering with the company fixing its rates for natural gas.

Bevier & Southern Rate Case: Case No. 598; styled in the Circuit Court of Cole County, Missouri, as State of Missouri ex rel. Bevier & Southern Railroad Company, a corporation, relator, v. Public Service Commission of Missouri, respondent. A proceeding to review in the courts an order of the Commission fixing monthly or commutation rates for the carriage of passengers upon and over the relator's railroad. A writ of certiorari has been issued in the case by the Circuit Court of Cole County dated December 30, 1915, and returnable March 6, 1916, directing the Commission to certify and return its record and proceedings in said cause for review by the court.

Joplin and Carthage Sleeping Car Case: Case No. 730; styled in the Circuit Court of Cole County, Missouri, as the Missouri Pacific Railway Company, and Benjamin F. Bush, Receiver of the property of the Missouri Pacific Railway Company, plaintiffs, v. John M. Atkinson et al., members of the Public Service Commission of Missouri, defendants. A proceeding to review an order of the Commission requiring the said railway company and receiver thereof to operate sleeping cars on said railway between St. Louis, Missouri, and Carthage and Joplin, Missouri, and intermediate points. A writ of certiorari has been issued in said case by the Circuit Court of Cole County, Missouri, dated December 31, 1915, and made returnable on or before the 1st day of February 1916, directing the Commission to return its record and proceedings in said cause for review by the court.

RATE DEPARTMENT.

Organization: In this department there are employed a chief rate expert, a rate clerk and one stenographer.

Duties of the Department: The law requires that tariffs shall be filed thirty days before their effectiveness and further provides that this Commission shall issue instructions relative

to the form and manner of filing such tariffs. This department carefully inspects each tariff filed to see that the full thirty days' notice required by law is given and that the tariff is compiled as the rules of the Commission require and that all changes in the tariff, either advances or reductions, are properly designated by symbols, so that it is an easy matter to ascertain whether a tariff is making any change in rates.

This department checks all rate exhibits introduced in evidence in rate cases and prepares all necessary data for the Commission in rate cases and handles all informal correspondence covering questions of the operation of railroads, street railroads, express and pullman companies and boat lines, except correspondence relative to accounting matters, engineering matters or financial matters.

Tariffs Suspended: Section 48 of the Public Service Commission Law authorizes the Commission to suspend any advanced rate that may be filed and to conduct an investigation relative to same. This provision of the statute has been invoked by the Commission a number of times during the past year and in only one instance has the suspension been entirely raised and the tariffs permitted to become effective.

Case 518 covers the suspension of concentration rates on dairy products, poultry, etc., and under a similar docket number the Interstate Commerce Commission suspended the same rates on interstate traffic.

Hearing before this Commission was delayed at the request of both the railroads and the shippers, pending decision of the Interstate Commerce Commission, and that body found that concentration rates upon these commodities produced discrimination against local shipments moving between the same points and that the industry was as largely developed in states where no concentration was given as in the states where the concentration rates were in effect. The Interstate Commerce Commission authorized the carriers to cancel these concentration rates.

The shippers stated to this Commission that the larger portion of their business was interstate and that the concentration rules on State traffic were of little value unless they were concurrently in effect on interstate traffic, and this Commission vacated its suspension permitting the privileges to be cancelled, but since that time the carriers have restored the privileges to a large extent in Missouri on both State and interstate traffic.

Case 572 covered a suspension of numerous tariffs filed during December, 1914. The rates embraced in these tariffs covered advances on cotton piece goods, grain, live stock, hay, specific rates to and from manufacturing points on both raw material and finished products, privilege of storage and stopping in transit, switching service on L. C. L. freight and numerous other subjects.

The Interstate Commerce Commission issued a suspension upon the same tariffs, their dockets being Nos. I. & S. 555 and 606. The tariffs were resuspended, and the final suspension limit coming on and hearings not having been completed and both the shippers and the carriers requesting this Commission to delay its final order pending decision of the Interstate Commerce Commission, the carriers voluntarily suspended the effective date of the tariffs to December 29th.

The final order of this Commission was issued December 24th, and refused permission to advance minimum weights on grain or to change the rates upon live stock, grain, cotton piece goods, rates on raw and finished material to and from factory points and denied the changes in the privileges above referred to. The final order of the Commission did permit the carriers to cancel out some specific rates on chicken coops, empty barrels, etc., which the testimony clearly showed had been put in by error and permitted advances in minimum weights on coke, cement and other minor changes to which there was no objection offered by the shippers.

In Case No. 674 the Commission suspended an advance in the rate on flue linings, same being brought about by taking flue linings out of what is commonly known as brick commodities and providing class rates thereon. This suspension is still pending.

In Case No. 721 the Commission suspended an advanced rate on cement from Hannibal, Missouri, to Columbia, Missouri, via the line of the Missouri, Kansas & Texas. The testimony showed that while the rate was not used from Hannibal to Columbia, the provision of the long and short haul clause of the Constitution held the rate down at intermediate points, and to permit an advance in the Hannibal-Columbia rate would bring about discrimination at intermediate points, on account of lower rates applying from St. Louis, Missouri, and various Illinois points to such destination than applied from Hannibal, Missouri. The Commission ordered the tariffs cancelled.

There is now pending before the Commission Case 814, being a suspension of advanced rates on coal via the lines of the Missouri Pacific and St. Louis, Iron Mountain & Southern railways.

It has been the practice of the carriers for many years to make blanket or group rates to the principal destinations of coal from various mines within certain distances and the Supreme Court of this State has held in what is known as the "McGrew Cases" that the long and short haul provision of the statutes of the State of Missouri prohibit the making of a lower rate between any two points than applies for the same distance between any other two points on the same carriers' lines in the State of Missouri, and the advances in coal rates which were suspended as above stated were brought about to avoid such violation of the long and short haul provision. This suspension is still pending.

Informal Complaints: Informal complaints covering all branches of railroad service other than grade crossings or defective railway equipment are handled by this department. On receipt of complaint from a shipper covering any of the above subjects, it is referred to the Rate Department, and if the complaint is in the nature of a formal one and it is believed the matter can be settled informally, the complaint is passed to the carriers as an informal complaint, with the request that they immediately advise if the prayer can be satisfied. If the complaint is informal in nature and there appears the least merit in the contention, it is passed to the correspondence complaint docket, given a number and investigation is completed, either by correspondence, by personal investigation, or by visit of a representative of this department. During the past year more than three thousand subject matters have been referred to this department and approximately 465 have been passed to the informal or correspondence complaint docket and of this number all but 32 have been adjusted.

The scope of these informal complaints has broadened materially during the past year and there is hardly a subject connected with the operation of railroad companies, express companies, street car lines and pullman companies that has not been embraced in one or more of these complaints. They reach from the change of the office hours of an agent to the building of depots, and the successful handling of these complaints during the past year has shown conclusively that the carriers

are largely assisting the Commission in the disposition of these matters by informal complaints.

The number of overcharge expense bills that were referred to the Commission during the past year show a material reduction as compared to the previous year, and it is the opinion of the chief of this department that after the new system of rates provided by the Commission in Cases 424 and 492 to 505 are thoroughly established, that the number of overcharge claims on State traffic will be still further reduced, although it is anticipated that the first six months of the coming year will show a heavy increase, due to the new basis of rates and due to the new system of joint line mileages ordered effective on January 1st.

Grain Rates: As stated in the Commission's report for the year ending December 31, 1914, petitions had been filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission contending that the Missouri statutory rates were discriminating against interstate traffic. An opinion was handed down by the Interstate Commerce Commission during the past year which thoroughly analyzed the conditions in Missouri, and that opinion ordered the carriers to provide one rate applicable on both State and interstate grain in Missouri. The opinion pointed out that the interstate Missouri grain rates were not all on the same plane, and intimated that a small portion of such rates might be considered too high and also pointed out that the Missouri statutory grain rates were lower than in any of the surrounding states, and lower than applied upon interstate commerce, and that the contention of the Missouri statutory grain rates would break down the entire basis of interstate rates from the Missouri River to the Atlantic Ocean and to the Gulf of Mexico.

Soon after the opinion of the Interstate Commission was handed down, numerous conferences were held between this Commission, representatives of the railroads and representatives of the shippers, and as a result a mileage scale of rates was adopted which reduced the interstate rates and advanced the statutory rates.

A peculiar condition has developed in the handling of a mileage schedule of rates on grain, in that the short line distance from the Mississippi River to the Missouri River is the distance from Hannibal, Missouri, to Kansas City, Missouri, namely 198 miles, and any mileage rate named for this distance would automatically name the maximum rate that would apply between any two river points, that is, from Kansas City to St.

Louis, from St. Joseph to St. Louis, and St. Joseph to Hannibal. While the short line distance between the rivers takes the 200 mile rate, the longest possible haul between the rivers in Missouri of a road actually competing for this traffic is 319 miles, so that if the scale were adopted for 200 miles it would automatically force the 320 mile line to adopt the rate, and due to the long and short haul provision of the Missouri statutes would cause that rate to apply at all intermediate points. Mileage rates are not maximum rates and do not reflect in any instance the actual traffic conditions between all points and in addition to the mileage rates the Commission ordered a conference between the experts of the railroads, representatives of the shippers and the chief rate expert of this Commission, and at that conference specific rates were checked in from every station in Missouri to the principal markets so that the mileage schedule of rates at the present time applies only upon a very small portion of Missouri intrastate traffic, namely, that portion which moves between two local points in the State, and as in the great majority of these cases transit is performed at an interior point, it results in every such instance in a reduction in the rate as compared to the statutory rate that was apparently raised, because under the statutory rate no transit privileges were accorded and if transit were performed, a combination of local rates over the milling point was applied.

Express Rates: As stated in the last annual report, the Interstate Commerce Commission scheme of express rates became effective on Missouri intrastate traffic August 10, 1914, and the reports indicate that the new rates have been a material advantage to Missouri interests as the total number of packages shipped under the new rates has materially increased, while the total amount of revenue has decreased, or if increased, the increase has been small. As an example of this, in September, 1914, the American Express Company handled 52,446 packages between the points in the State of Missouri, while in September, 1915, that company handled 53,508 packages or an increase of 1,142 packages. The revenue in 1914 was \$21,424, while in 1915 the revenue was \$21,403, or a reduction of \$21 in revenue with an increase of over 1,000 in the number of shipments handled.

The express company's report of its whole business in the United States for the year ending June 30, 1914, shows a considerable loss, and the Interstate Commerce Commission granted

the express companies the privilege of changing the basis of making the minimum rate, resulting in an approximate increase of from 14 cents to 4 cents per package, the minimum charge having advanced from 21 cents to 25 cents. The express companies have not been permitted to make this advance on Missouri intrastate rates up to the present time.

Official State Map: During the early part of the year, the Commission commenced the distribution of the official map of Missouri for the year 1914. This map is complete in every detail, showing every line of railroad in the State of Missouri, each line being shown in a distinct color, as well as showing every post office whether located upon a railroad or not.

This map shows the distance between each two railroad stations in the entire State, and all junction points where actual physical track connection exists between two or more carriers the town is shown in blue. This map will be of great advantage to the shippers of the State in figuring rates under the Commission's order in Case 424, which provides that the rate shall be based by the line by which the lowest rate can be made, and in the figuring of these rates it is necessary to know if actual physical track connection exists at the various junction points. The demands upon the Commission for these maps have been extremely heavy and at this date the supply is practically exhausted.

Principal Cases Disposed of During the Year: Case 518 known as the concentration of poultry and dairy products.

For many years tariffs of the carriers provided that less than carload shipments of poultry, eggs, butter, etc., might be forwarded to certain points and there stored, reworked and concentrated and forwarded from such points in carload lots, and that on the forwarding of such shipments from such concentration points the inbound rate would be reduced far below the local rate applicable for such service. The carriers filed tariffs effective in December, 1914, providing for the cancellation of these privileges and the same were suspended by the Interstate Commerce Commission as well as this Commission. Hearings were held and the Commission found that no good reason existed why the carriers should perform the less than carload service into the concentrating points at a lower rate than such service was performed on shipments not intended for concentration. The system requiring an expensive audit on the part of the carriers and was in fact more expensive to the carriers

than similar shipments having final destination at the transit point, and the Interstate Commerce Commission having permitted the tariffs to become effective, thus cancelling the privilege on interstate traffic, this Commission found that little advantage would result to the Missouri shippers in having the privilege, and that discrimination between State and interstate transportation would result, and ordered the vacation of the suspension and permitted the tariffs to become effective.

Case 598, Bevier & Southern. The Bevier & Southern Railway for years provided commutation rates for miners from Bevier, Missouri, to various points on its lines, the longest haul approximating ten miles, and in the early part of 1915 filed tariff providing for an advance in these commutation rates of from 100% to 300%. The Commission found that the advances were unreasonable but that the charge of \$1.00 and \$1.25 which the carriers theretofore charged was not sufficient remuneration for the service performed and permitted an advance of 50 cents per ticket per month on each commutation ticket.

Case 424, Joint Line Rates. This case was instituted by the Commission to determine the necessity of through rates and routes on all commodities, the case being filed in September, 1914. The Commission found that as a general practice the railroads in Missouri did not provide through rates from points on one line to points on other lines, and that the failure on the part of the carriers to provide such through rates was discrimination against State traffic in that such through rates were provided from interstate points to Missouri points and from Missouri points to interstate points, and the order provides that in figuring rates from a point on one line to a point on any other line, straight mileage rates shall be used with the addition of certain small arbitraries, depending upon the commodity or the class of the shipment, so that when this order becomes effective the shippers in Missouri will be on a parity with interstate shippers.

Advance Rate Cases: In the latter part of 1914 the principal carriers in Missouri filed applications with the Commission, asking for advances in practically all rates. Numerous hearings were held and the case was finally submitted in June of the present year and decision handed down on November 10th.

The applications of the carriers asked for increased freight rates varying from 25% to as high as 300%, in many instances asking for authority to charge rates which, if granted and put into effect, would have permitted manufacturers located in the states of Illinois and Iowa to have moved traffic through Missouri manufacturing and jobbing points to Missouri destinations at considerably less rates than such Missouri manufacturing or jobbing points would have to the same destinations.

In this case the Commission refused permission to the carriers to make any advances on approximately twenty commodities and provided new rate scales to apply on all other commodities, the scales being readjusted and carrying both advances and reductions, but representing what was considered by the Commission to be fair, reasonable rates.

As an example of the conditions existing at the time of this investigation, there was in effect between points in Missouri but one rate on all classes of live stock and it was found that Missouri intrastate traffic was the only traffic in the United States which had such a rate. It is manifestly unfair to assess the same total charge upon 12,000 pounds of sheep as would be assessed upon 24,000 pounds of horses or mules.

The value of the commodity is in no way comparative, nor is the liability to damage the same. Freight rates cannot be based upon the actual cost of service as the actual transportation cost of 100 pounds of sand and 100 pounds of silk is identical, and if the same rate were made upon the two commodities, it would result in either the confiscation of a railroad or the stopping of the movement of sand, depending on whether the silk or sand rate was applied. A slight scratch upon a sheep would result in no damage, while the same scratch upon a fine horse would result in a blemish that would cost the railroad company many times the revenue secured from its transportation, and in the readjustment of the rates as made by the Commission in this case, these matters were taken into consideration and the live stock rate was reduced insofar as its application upon shipments of sheep was concerned and materially raised insofar as its application upon the higher valued commodities, horses and mules, resulting in a fair, reasonable rate for the movement of both commodities.

It has been estimated by experts that the result of the Commission's order will give to the carriers approximately a 3% to 5% increase in their revenue from the transportation of freight traffic.

ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT.

This department consists of a chief engineer, an assistant chief engineer, seven assistant engineers and one stenographer. The duties of the engineering department consist of:

1. Appraisal of property of steam railroads, electric railroads, express companies, electric, water, gas, heating and telephone utilities for use as a basis for rate making, or for accounting or capitalization. The appraisal may also serve as a basis for taxation.

2. Investigation of accidents on steam and electric railways resulting in injury or death.

3. Protection, alteration and elimination of grade crossings.

4. Investigation of safety and adequacy of service rendered by steam railroads.

5. Investigation of adequacy of service rendered by any public utility.

6. Investigation to determine necessity and safety of switch track and sidetrack connections.

7. Investigation of signal systems and interlocking plants.

8. Track scale testing.

Appraisal of Properties of Public Utilities: The appraisal of the following public utilities has been completed:

Kansas City Electric Light Company,

St. Joseph Gas Company,

Ft. Scott & Nevada Light, Heat & Water Company,

Clinton Light & Water Company,

West St. Louis Water & Light Company,

Springfield Gas & Electric Company,

Home Telephone Company of Joplin,

Sedalia City Water Company,

Mississippi River & Bonne Terre Railway Company.

The engineering department is now engaged in appraising the property of the Union Electric Light and Power Company of St. Louis.

Investigation of Accidents on Steam and Electric Railways: Steam and electric railways are required to wire immediate reports of serious accidents. These messages are followed by detailed report of accident. At the end of each month a summary of all accidents that have occurred during that month

is filed with the Commission. All collisions and injuries and deaths at highway crossings are carefully investigated. The purpose of these investigations is to determine the cause of the accident and to apply corrective measures.

Compilation and analysis of the accident reports of the carriers to the Commission for eleven months of the year 1915, (December not included) disclose the following facts:

Increased number of accidents in 1915 was very probably due to heavy rainfall.

Protection, Alteration and Elimination of Grade Crossings:

A subway under the tracks of the Missouri Pacific Railway Company and a viaduct over the tracks of the Chicago & Alton Railroad Company at Blue avenue, Jackson County, near Kansas City are under construction to comply with orders of the Commission.

Work has not been started on the elimination of the crossings with the Missouri Pacific Railway Company at Eager road, McRee avenue, Shaw avenue and Kingshighway, St. Louis. This work has been delayed by the elimination of the Chouteau avenue crossing which is considered to be more important than the crossings at Eager road, etc. The construction of the Chouteau avenue viaduct was started recently.

Plans covering the elimination of the crossings with the Rock Island at DeBalivere avenue, Waterman avenue, Kingshighway avenue, Delmar avenue, Olive Street road and Maple avenue, St. Louis, have been revised.

The City of St. Louis presented a track depression scheme for the elimination of these crossings last summer, but since that time the territory was covered by a flood from the river Des Peres. It is understood that the city plan for elimination of these crossings is being revised.

The work of eliminating the crossings at Sixth, Monterey and Olive streets, St. Joseph, has been delayed by failure of interested parties to agree upon plans.

Plans for the reconstruction of the Main street viaduct, Joplin, have recently been approved.

Investigation of Safety and Adequacy of Service Rendered by Steam Railways: The Cedar City branch of the Chicago & Alton was inspected as a result of a derailment. The Company agreed to comply with the suggestions of this department to place new ties, additional ballast and heavy rail.

In general, the main line track in Missouri is in first-class condition. The railroads have done considerable betterment work this year to comply with the suggestions contained in last year's annual inspection reports.

Investigation and report was made on the application for a passenger station at North Market street, St. Louis.

An inspection was made of the coaches on the Tipton-Versailles branch of the Missouri Pacific.

Investigation of the Adequacy of Service Rendered by Any Public Utility: The application of the United Railways of St. Louis to eliminate certain stops was investigated. The Commission permitted the Company to make a three months' trial of the skip-stop proposition on the Olive and Broadway lines.

Investigation to Determine Necessity and Safety of Switch and Side Track Connections: An investigation and report was made on the application of the Landau Cabinet Company, Tower Grove, St. Louis, for a siding. This Company was deprived of a siding when the tracks of the Missouri Pacific and Frisco Railway companies were depressed to eliminate the Tower Grove crossing.

Investigation of Signal Systems and Interlocking Plants: Plans for the following signal systems and interlocking plants have been approved:

Interlocking plants on the St. L & S. F. at Nichols and South-eastern Junction are nearly completed.

Track Scale Tests: No track scale tests were made for the reason that the Commission did not have the funds with which to provide men and equipment.

General: The Engineering Department now has four men at work on the appraisal of the property of the Union Electric Light and Power Company of St. Louis. The Company has had approximately 90 men at work since June of this year and their inventory has not been completed. The Company will probably complete its appraisal by March 1, 1916.

With these facts at hand, it is apparent that this department is badly handicapped.

Lack of funds has not only seriously handicapped the work that has been attempted but has actually prevented the undertaking of important work.

DEPARTMENT OF STATISTICS AND ACCOUNTS.

The personnel of this department has been changed since the last Annual Report. It now consists of a chief accountant, a statistician, five assistant accountants and a stenographer.

Audits Made During the Year: Kansas City Electric Light Company, Standard Electric Light Company of Kansas City, Kansas City Heating Company.

In addition to the work done on the books of the above companies during the year 1914, it required the time of five men for practically three months during the present year to complete the audits, which were made for the purpose of determining the reasonableness of the rates charged. The Electric Light Plant at Kansas City is one of considerable magnitude, being the second largest utility of its kind in the State.

A complete audit was made of the books of the St. Joseph Gas Company to determine whether the rates as charged were exorbitant. This work required the services of two accountants for a period of two months.

A supplemental audit of the books of the Mississippi River & Bonne Terre Railway Company was made for the purpose of ascertaining the result of the company's operations for one year under the reduced passenger rates which became effective during July, 1913. Three men were engaged on this work for practically two months.

A supplemental audit of the books of the West St. Louis Water and Light Company was made in 1915, which required the time of two men for a month and a half. This company's scope of operation covers practically all of St. Louis county and the divisions and statistics necessary to show the revenue

and service in the various localities required considerable time. The investigation resulted from a complaint and was to determine the reasonableness of the rates in effect.

A supplemental audit was made for the purpose of ascertaining the result of the Springfield Gas and Electric Company's operations for one year under the rates prescribed by the Commission, in order that same could be presented to the United States District Court. Two accountants spent about two months on this work.

The accounting force was also engaged in making complete audits of the Clinton Light and Water Company, City Water Company of Sedalia and Home Telephone Company of Joplin during the year of 1915, all of these companies having requested increase in rates.

The Clinton company was audited by one man in a month and a half. The Sedalia company was completed by two men in six weeks, while two men consumed about two months time in examining the records of the Telephone company at Joplin.

In order to determine the reasonableness of existing rates, a complete audit was also made of the Ft. Scott & Nevada Light, Heat, Water and Power Company, and a supplemental audit of the Kirksville Light, Heat and Power Company.

Work in Connection with Railways' Application for Increase in Intrastate Rates: A great amount of time was given to the study of exhibits and statistics presented by railways, operating in Missouri, in their application for increase in freight and passenger intrastate rates.

The chief accountant and statistician were in attendance at the hearings which commenced December 2, 1914, and continued intermittently until June 18, 1915. The carriers introduced many exhibits, chief among them being a "Formula used in the Apportionment of Revenues, Expenses and Property to Interstate and Intrastate Passenger and Freight Traffic in the State of Missouri."

The formula was a comprehensive and detailed scheme of accounting, and a thorough understanding of its bases and methods and the results of its application required serious consideration. After a lengthy study of the carriers' formula, the chief accountant and statistician, in order to bring to the Commission's attention certain divisions of revenues and expenses which the carriers had not properly prescribed, drafted a formula setting out different methods for apportioning the rev-

venues and expenses, together with their reasons for such deviations. Analytical studies were made of the numerous exhibits presented by the carriers, as well as of the annual reports on file with the Commission, and from these sources were compiled detailed and statistical statements of values, revenues, expenses, mileage, etc. These statements, as well as the corrected formula referred to above, were submitted to the Commission at various hearings.

Statistical Data Compiled: One of the duties of the department is the compilation of data in comparative form of information submitted to the Commission in the annual reports of utilities operating in the State. Such comparative statistical data for steam railroads, electric railways, express companies, and the Pullman Sleeping Car Company has been compiled for the past two fiscal years, but has not yet been printed.

Statistical information of the above nature has also been under process of compilation for electric, gas, water and heating utilities for the year ending December 31, 1914. Owing to the fact that this was the first year in which the prescribed classification of accounts was effective, and also to the fact that the records of many utilities were incomplete, in some cases practically no accounting records having been kept by the companies, a voluminous correspondence was entailed in attempting to secure the necessary information.

Evidences of Necessity for Uniform System of Accounting: That a uniform system of accounting was badly needed and that its adoption will be of great benefit to the utilities is manifested from the multitudinous letters received concerning the annual reports sent out.

A considerable part of the utilities operating in this State have no record of their plant value, do not keep separate accounts for the different classes of joint utilities they operate; some conduct a combined public utility and private business, the revenues received, the expenses disbursed, and the original cost of the plants producing different services have not been recorded separately for each enterprise, consequently such companies do not know which enterprise produces profit and which is operated at a loss.

Certain owners of utilities have visited this department of the Commission for the purpose of filing their reports, which were incomplete and which were filled out merely to comply with the law. After summarizing the assets and liabilities

and analyzing the revenues and expenses from the data submitted, it was frequently found that the plants were being operated at a loss, due to improper management, excessive coal consumption, etc., and for the reason that no provision was made for plant replacements; the net revenues in some of these plants being hardly sufficient to meet interest requirements.

From the remarks of owners that have personally visited the offices of the Commission and from many communications received, it is evident that the utilities realize the necessity of and the benefits to be derived from recording their operations in conformity with the uniform classification prescribed.

Work in Connection with Installation of Uniform System of Accounts: The correspondence incident to the establishment of a uniform system of accounts throughout the State is necessarily voluminous. The wide range in the extent of operations, capitalization and investment required an extremely elastic classification.

Many detailed accounts absolutely necessary for the proper recording of transactions of a large utility would be of no value whatsoever to small companies. Consequently, it became necessary to advise the majority of the utilities of their individual needs; this condition and the fact that many of the smaller companies had heretofore kept insufficient or no details of their investments and operations necessitated numerous letters of explanation and advice.

Future Benefits of Accounting System: When the prescribed accounting system has been thoroughly understood and followed in detail and the annual reports of the utilities have been incorporated in comparative schedules and tables, it will be of immeasurable benefit in ascertaining average life, average cost and average operating efficiency data. It will aid in settling many controversies between the utilities and the communities they serve, as the annual report of each utility will show whether the rate of return is sufficient, exorbitant or inadequate. It will aid in procuring new capital, as the prospective investor will know that the capital investment of the company, as shown by the records, will contain only proper charges to that account and that the records of the past operations will reflect true conditions. The holders of bonds will know that the integrity of their investment is being preserved through the medium of a proper reserve for depreciation. The stockholders can readily ascertain by a study of the report the pres-

ent condition of their property and they will know that the dividends received were not declared before making a reserve sufficient to care for future contingencies and replacements. Those in control of the utilities' operation will be better able to ascertain wherein the service and management could be improved, and finally the tables of plant investment, capitalization and operating costs of the various utilities of the State set up in comparative form will be of immeasurable value to those utilities who seek beyond their own immediate environments for knowledge of their particular business.

Present Work of the Department: The accountants are at present engaged in making an audit of the books of the Union Electric Light and Power Company of St. Louis to aid in ascertaining the reasonableness of rates charged.

GAS, ELECTRIC, HEAT AND WATER DEPARTMENT.

The entire duties of this department as outlined in previous reports are as follows:

First: The keeping of an accurate official record of all corporations and municipalities furnishing gas, electric, heating or water service in this State which come under the jurisdiction of the Commission in accordance with the definitions provided by the Public Service Commission Law.

Second: Attention to all correspondence and verbal requests for information coming before the Commission on matters pertaining to the business of furnishing gas, electric, heating or water service and allied technical subjects in general.

Third: Adjustment of all correspondence complaints involving gas, electric, heating or water service.

Fourth: The filing of the schedule of rates of gas, electric, heating and water utilities.

Fifth: General inspection and test of service meters.

Sixth: General supervision of matters pertaining to quality of gas, electric, heating and water service.

Seventh: General supervision of construction and operation of equipment by gas, electric, heating and water utilities in so far as the public interest, public health and protection of public and employees is concerned.

Eighth: Miscellaneous technical work in connection with formal complaints and investigations before the Commission involving gas, electric, heating and water utilities.

The number of employees in this department has remained the same since its organization. Mr. J. D. Bowles, who had been chief of the department, resigned October 1, 1915, to take a position with one of the larger utilities operating in this State. Mr. Bowles had been with the department since its organization and had successfully conducted it through the formative period so important in any enterprise. That the present efficiency was attained in so short a time was largely due to his initiative and earnest efforts. His familiarity with the circumstances and peculiarities of the various utilities and municipalities of this State was of great benefit to the Commission. Mr. Joseph A. Whitlow was selected by the Commission to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of Mr. Bowles.

The department has now passed through the formative period, the effect of its creation in carrying out some of the intents and provisions of the Public Service Commission Law being now a matter of experience.

Published Schedules of Rates and Charges: It was an important step when, in compliance with the Public Service Commission Law and the Commission's orders, the various utilities and municipalities filed their schedules of rates and charges. This was begun during the first year of the Commission's existence and cannot be called complete yet. The importance of this step has been far-reaching. Hardly a day passes that inquiries are not received from consumers or prospective consumers in regard to some of the rates charged by their respective utilities. The knowledge that all rates, charges, and rules of practice are published and open for inspection has almost removed the universal suspicion of discrimination. The greatest benefit, however, has been for the utilities themselves. Many of them were very tardy in filing their schedules in accordance with the Commission's order. However, it was found that complaining consumers were better satisfied when a letter from the Commission explaining standard practice in connection with the various matters was received in reply to such inquiries or complaint. The tone of the utilities in dealing with the public has been appreciably softened in many instances. Comparisons of the various schedules and methods of various companies have had the effect of educating the managements of some of the weaker utilities, awakening them to possibilities not before realized in their own plants.

Rules Regulating Utilities: The filing of schedules was an important step but was more in the nature of organization and has

now become a matter of routine. The most important constructive act of this department was collecting and compiling the various rules of different commissions and of the utilities themselves, regarding standards and quality of service. These rules were carefully examined and digested and, together with such ideas as were obtained from the Commission's experience, were finally issued during the past year as General Order No. 20, Rules Regulating Gas, Electric and Water Service, effective October 1, 1915. Some of the most important points covered in this order are the following:

Fixing certain standards of service and requiring continuous records of operation.

Regulations regarding meter-reading and billing, and disconnecting the service of offending or delinquent consumers.

Limiting surety deposits and fixing an interest-bearing rate on such deposits.

Rules regarding the pressure and quality of gas.

Providing for bacteriological tests of water supply and fixing standards of water service.

Requiring a definite voltage regulation in the operation of electric plants.

Another important feature of this order was that requiring a certain accuracy of gas, electric and water meters, fixing periods of test and requiring plants to maintain facilities for such tests. The procedure to be followed in case of complaints is outlined. The Commission itself has not been able to purchase the equipment or maintain testers or inspectors for any of this work, but arrangements have been made whereby the facilities afforded by the laboratories of the School of Engineering of the State University at Columbia can be used at a nominal expense.

Future Regulations: There are many items in the operation of gas, electric and water plants that undoubtedly require regulation, if for no other reasons than to induce uniformity. Important decisions have been handed down by this Commission in specific cases that could well become the subject of general orders applying to all companies of a certain class.

One subject that should have early attention is the issuing of uniform service extension rules. As the matter now stands each company or municipality makes and enforces its own rules regarding charges for extending mains or service pipes for water or gas, or line extensions and service wires to houses.

The result is that there are almost as many policies followed as there are companies and municipalities operating these plants. Competing companies often depart from any fixed policy in their efforts to get customers, with the result that there is often discrimination in appearance if not in fact. Fairness to the consumers also demands that this matter be adjusted. The extension rules of some companies seem to be designed along some reasonable or well defined business policy, while others hold to the policy of taking on only customers immediately profitable. No doubt the interests of the whole body of consumers demand that the investments be not made lavishly. On the other hand, any one reasonably situated should not be denied those things which have come to be regarded as necessities. The most reasonable rule to follow appears to be one that would reject or assess a charge against only those consumers the serving of whom would entail a higher rate to the whole body of consumers.

Since this Commission has supervision over water companies and may require facilities for supplying a reasonably pure and safe water for domestic use, it appears that more attention should be given to the source of supply, which is generally some stream. As the situation now stands there is no regulation. Sewage is being discharged into open streams that farther along in their course supply drinking water to many communities. A paper presented to the Missouri State Medical Association, in March, 1912, by Dr. O. W. H. Mitchell, recently a member of the Medical Faculty of the State University, describes a condition of this sort that created a virulent epidemic of typhoid in a Missouri town. The public health as well as modern ideas of convenience demand that people abandon the surface well and secure their supply from a central plant supplying good water. Nothing is more essential or more fruitful of disaster if allowed to go uncontrolled. An appropriate law regulating the sources of water supply should be immediately asked of our Legislature.

The following table relating to the water supply of the various communities has been compiled from the various sources of information available to the department, and indicates in a majority of cases a tolerably safe condition. One item of especial interest is the number of instances where the supply is from artesian and deep wells. This number is constantly increasing and indicates a lively interest in this important necessity.

Adjustment of Correspondence Complaints: Previous reports have referred to the work of this department in handling informal inquiries and complaints. Next to its duties in carrying out the provisions of the Public Service Commission Law assigned to it, this matter has become the most important. The great majority of complaints can be adjusted by explanations as to standard practice and underlying principles in the matter complained of and by inducing companies to institute and follow some well defined, sensible and nondiscriminatory practice. Sometimes one or both parties to the controversy visit the Commission's offices, and sometimes the head of the department visits the place of the controversy and, if possible, brings about an adjustment of the difficulty. Records are kept of the more serious complaints that could easily have developed into formal cases. In 1915 there were 50 such cases settled without formal procedure. These were of the following nature: nineteen water; twenty-six electric and five gas. Besides the cases so listed there was an endless amount of inquiries and correspondence on general matters of a less serious nature. Outside of conditions peculiar to the individual case or community, these informal complaints resolve themselves into certain divisions involving principles with which the public is in general not familiar and where the equity of the cases is not apparent to the layman. These relate to the following items: Cost of extensions, previously discussed; requiring customers to furnish or rent the meter; high bills due to individual or seasonal conditions; and the minimum charges for some fixed periods; usually a month.

Meter Charges: In formulating the general rules regulating gas, electric and water service, it was originally proposed to include a requirement to the effect that utilities should own all service meters used in the measurement of their product. However, after a thorough and exhaustive study of this subject from every standpoint and after the views of a large number of persons were sought and carefully considered, the Commission concluded that the most reasonable course for the present would be to omit any mention of the matter of meter ownership in its general rules, leaving this feature to be dealt with by the utility and the citizens of each community as the case seemed to require, or by the Commission on specific complaint.

However, as meters really constitute a portion of the facilities for furnishing service, it is reasonable to conclude that they

should be the property of the utility and a part of its capitalization and should be furnished to consumers free of charge and that the charges for service should be arranged accordingly, and the Commission has borne this in mind in the adjustment of complaints arising from this source which have been brought to its attention for formal action. It is obvious that there is less likelihood of reasons for complaint where the meter is owned and furnished free by the utility and the rates for service are based on the investment necessary for such an outlay, than where the consumer is compelled either to purchase or rent his meter although charged a slightly lower rate for service. As a matter of fact, the cost in the end to the consumer is practically the same in either case, the difference being, mainly, that where the utility owns the meters a better feeling is likely to exist between utility and consumers and results are generally more satisfactory.

High Bills: Adjustment of charges on any basis other than that of the meter register is very difficult, as investigations regarding the accuracy of such charges must necessarily be made at the point of usage. If there is doubt as to the accuracy of the meter, the utility will test the meter at its laboratory or it may be boxed in the customer's presence and shipped to the State University at Columbia for test. Rule 44 of General Order No. 20 gives the method of procedure in either case. The Commission has also arranged with the Water Department of the City of St. Louis for having tests of water meters made there in case customers in that vicinity wish to witness the test made at some other point than the utility's laboratory. Few complaints come from cities that have tests made by city officials.

Where a condition of high usage which cannot be readily explained exists for some time, the customer should read his own meter daily until the accuracy is established or the fault located. Utilities can instruct a customer in a few minutes how to read the meter, after which it takes only a moment a day to keep an accurate register of the service used.

The utilities themselves would probably find the cost of adjusting complaints would be reduced and the good-will of the public considerably increased if they would provide inducements for the consumers to make periodic readings of their meters, especially when a controversy arises. This might be done by circulating blanks with spaces provided for inserting

readings or printed dials on which the positions of the pointers in the meter dial might be marked, all arranged and dated for daily or weekly readings.

The following table shows the variation in the number of hours per month when light is needed due to the change of season, and easily explains the cause of many high bills for which the consumer often thinks there is no possible reason:

Concerning the Fairness of Minimum Charges: This Commission often receives letters from the customers of corporations or municipalities furnishing these classes of service, complaining of the policy of the corporation or municipality of assessing its customers with a so-called "minimum charge" for some stated time, usually a month, where the service is metered and where the meter readings show either no usage or a usage less in value than the minimum charge.

It is the experience of the Commission that frequently a detailed explanation of certain standard practices of public utilities which appear unreasonable to the consumer results in a better understanding when the dissatisfied consumer sees that these practices are advisable or necessary. Accordingly, it is considered important to explain that the principle of "minimum charges" is generally considered fair in application and is given recognition in practically all standards of rate-making.

This Commission has repeatedly been called upon to pass formally upon this practice and has ruled that it is justifiable. It is sufficient to quote but one instance from the Commission's proceedings, that in the case of *Calvert v. Clinton Light and Water Co.*, 1 Mo. P. S. C. l. c. 291:

"Without discussing at length the reasons in support of allowing a minimum charge for service upon meter rates, it is sufficient to say that the company has incurred the expense and outlay of connecting the consumer with the mains, must at all times be ready to render the service, and must also incur the expense of reading the meter and keeping the account of the consumer, whether water is used or not. To meet this expense, the company is entitled to compensation, and, therefore, to a reasonable minimum charge, and so courts and authorities upon the subject now generally hold. *State ex rel. v. Gas Light Company*, 34 Mo. App. 501; 2 *Wyman on Public Service Corporations*, sec. 1247."

It is readily seen that in addition to the actual cost of producing electricity or of pumping water, there are certain fixed expenses mentioned in the above for which it is proper to make fixed charges, that are proportional, not to the customers' demands but to the number of customers. This bookkeeping, expense of reading meters, interest, repairs and depreciation on meters and service connections, together with the actual expense of maintaining pressure constantly at the consumers' premises, may be regarded as almost a personal service. These

costs go on continually, whether the service is used or not, and are almost the same for each customer. The company or municipality is therefore entitled to recompense for the investment and service necessary to maintain this condition.

If rates are too high, they should be reduced, and this Commission stands ready to co-operate in seeing that reasonable rates are instituted and enforced. Assuming, therefore, that the company or municipality is securing only a fair return on its investment, every expenditure must be returned in the form of revenue from the sale of service, and the fixed expense of reading meters, billing, etc., must be paid by the customers. If not paid by the recipient of such service, it must be paid by his fellow-consumers in the form of higher rates for the service rendered them. The matter thus becomes a discrimination against the consumer who uses the service regularly in favor of the person who uses it very little or not at all. Rates are lowered by making liberal use of the service, since cost of production per unit decreases as the number of units produced is increased, consequently the persons using service freely are helping toward a still lower rate and must be encouraged, or at least not discriminated against.

In view of these facts and also of the Commission's rulings in this matter, it is evident that complaints of this nature can receive the Commission's attention only in case it is claimed that these minimum charges are unduly large or unjustly discriminatory.

TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH DEPARTMENT.

During the past year this department has been instrumental in having the smaller telephone companies throughout the State systematize their rules and regulations pertaining to the handling of their business with their subscribers and with the public at large, through efforts to have the companies file, not only their rate sheets, but also a copy of their rules prescribing the method of handling their business with the public. Many of the smaller companies had no such rules before the creation of the Commission, and it is of great importance that such terms of service be filed in full to avoid misunderstandings and controversies which would be later settled at some expense to both parties. This department is giving all possible informal assistance to the companies who ask help in preparing safe and reasonable rules of this nature. It has been impossible to secure authentic data from some of the smaller companies for the reason that practically no records have been kept by these companies.

The Commission's records now show 488 telephone companies as having rate schedules on file in over 700 cities, towns and rural communities of this State. This is an increase of 42 over the year 1914. The securing of these additional rate sheets was in many instances difficult, and it was only after the persistent efforts on the part of this office that they were obtained. Only a small number were new companies establishing a telephone business during the year, but the greater number of these schedules were from companies which had been in existence for some time but had failed to comply with the requirements of the Public Service Commission Law.

During the year 1915 sixty-seven formal cases were filed with the Commission with respect to telephone and telegraph companies. At the beginning of the year fifteen cases were pending, making in all a total of eighty-two. Of this number all but sixteen were disposed of, and the following table sets forth the principles involved:

Of the telephone cases handled during the year, and in fact since the creation of the Commission, the cases of the Southwestern Telegraph and Telephone Company of St. Louis were most important in the time and labor involved in the investigation and with regard to the number of patrons interested. The experts of both the Accounting and Engineering Departments of the Commission worked several months on these cases, in order that the rights of the telephone company as well as the rights of the public be protected, and that the findings should furnish justice to both. The cases are still pending.

In only one case was the finding of the Commission appealed to the courts. In this case the Circuit Court upheld the opinion of the Public Service Commission, and the case has since been appealed to the Supreme Court.

Through the filing of a formal complaint by one of the railway companies, the Commission of its own initiative issued an order for a formal hearing of representatives from telephone, telegraph, electric, electric signalling, street railway and railway companies, and from municipalities operating public utilities, to meet in Jefferson City and submit to the Commission specifications for the construction and maintenance of underground and overhead lines of such wire-using companies at the crossings over the rights of way of railroad companies on public highways, with the ultimate view of adopting uniform rules and regulations governing the construction and maintenance of poles, wires, cables, signal and other circuits of similar character over the rights of way, tracks and lines of wire of railroad corporations in this State. At the present time there is no law in the State regulating such matters, neither has ruling been made by the Commission bearing upon the sub-

ject, and it is of very great importance that some such action be taken to protect life and property by requiring of the companies a safe and standard form of construction at these points. The committees of the various corporations are now at work, and will submit their findings to the Commission.

In the formal cases heard during the year, the right of a third party to intervene was exercised in nine cases.

The Commission has in two cases which were decided during the year allowed a telephone company to charge a rate to its subscribers for local service only, and a rate higher than that charged for local service is allowed where the subscriber is given unlimited service to other exchanges in the immediate vicinity.

The number of informal complaints received in this department during the year was 153, and with 20 which were pending at the beginning of the year made 173 cases to be disposed of. All but 18 have been settled according to the disposition given above. The work of this department in this regard is to have the complaint satisfied through informal correspondence, without the necessity of it becoming a formal case, and from the small number of these which have been made formal it would seem that the efforts have been most successful.

A large per cent of the time of the chief of this department is devoted to the extensive correspondence and personal interviews in the interest of improved telephone and telegraph service, in a way too general to be listed specifically under the above heading. The best quality of service most economically produced is sought in the interest alike of the consuming public and the producing utility corporation, and to this end this department is constantly assisting the interested parties throughout the State.

STOCK AND BOND APPLICATIONS.

The Commission has followed the rules as stated in its previous annual reports in the authorization of stocks, bonds, notes and other evidences of indebtedness during the past year. The money stringency and the falling off of the market for securities of all classes of corporations since the breaking out of the European War, in early August, 1914, has been quite apparent to the Commission in the small number of applications for authority to issue stocks and bonds during the year 1915. The stock exchanges throughout the United States have been able to sell some public utility securities during the last two or three months of this year, but up to that time there seemed to have been practically no demand for such securities by the investing public.

The following table shows the applications which have been made to the Commission during the term covered by this report and whether they are yet under consideration of the Commission or whether same have been passed upon under the provisions of the Public Service Commission Law and orders entered therein.

PUBLIC RELATIONS.

The public service corporations operating in this State are fast learning that the common principle of doing business in the open, giving it the fullest possible publicity, taking the public into their fullest possible confidence, should be adopted by them as the wisest and best policy. We believe that full and frank publicity should be the policy of every public service corporation with its patrons, to the end that all proper information to the investor and the public in general may be had. All public utilities are learning that the only way to gain the confidence of the public is first of all to merit it by square and frank dealing with the public. All public utilities should give full publicity to all dealings with the public; tell the public how much the company is earning, and how it represents only a fair return on the value of the property devoted to the service of the public, and whenever there is a dispute over any matter of service, resolve the doubt in favor of the public and do even more than is strictly required under its duties as a public service corporation.

We believe the public is now becoming ready to meet the public service corporations at the halfway station with fair and just treatment. If the integrity of investment, vital alike to rich and poor, employe and employer, is to be properly maintained, such should be the attitude of the public towards such public service companies.

We think the attitude of the public toward the public service companies as to being on better terms is shown by the number of informal complaints. During the year 1914 this Commission received 651 informal complaints, while during the year 1915 it only received 481 of such complaints. This desirable condition has been largely the result of broader and more liberal policies upon the part of public utilities and their dealing with the public. The adoption by the Commission of uniform service rules for gas, electric and water utilities has doubtless tended to reduce the number of informal complaints.

We also desire to state that the conditions between the public utilities and their employes are being greatly improved. The street railway companies operating in St. Louis and Kansas City have adopted the policy of issuing monthly bulletins giving information not only to the public, but to the employes.

of the Company, as to the operating and other conditions of such utilities. A better feeling of loyalty is being cultivated by all the public utilities with their employes. A telephone company operating in one of our large cities, recently visited by members of the Commission, it was observed that the employes were treated with much kind consideration. A free lunch was furnished to the girls operating at the switchboard, and on rainy and snowy days the Company used its own vehicles of transportation in sending after such employes.

But few complaints have been made to the Commission during the year just ending as to any unfair or discourteous treatment of the public by agents or employes of the various public utilities operating in this State. We are gratified to be able to report that conditions are improving all along the lines above indicated.

FEEES COLLECTED.

During the twelve months from January 1, 1915, to December 31, 1915, the Commission has collected fees aggregating \$18,150.50. This sum has been paid into the State Treasury. As one of the sources of revenue to the State through the agency of the Commission has been the fees collected from the approval of stock and bond issues, the money stringency and the falling off in the market for securities of all classes of public service corporations occasioned by the European War has been markedly noticeable to the Commission in the small number of applications for authority to issue stocks and bonds. This difficulty experienced by railroads and other public utility corporations of this State in securing money for the sale of securities has evidenced itself in the amount of fees collected by the Commission.

In Conclusion.

Inasmuch as the Forty-ninth General Assembly will not convene until in early January, 1917, the Commission withhold making any recommendations for the consideration of your Excellency or of the Legislature in this report. The Commission will report all of its recommendations relative to proposed legislation to the Forty-ninth General Assembly in its Fourth Annual Report.
