THE COMMISSION

THE CHAIRMAN

Chairman William R. Clark was Governor Warren E. Hearnes' first appointment to the Public Service Commission. Chairman Clark assumed the position on June 1, 1965.



WILLIAM R. CLARK

Prior to his appointment, Chairman Clark was engaged in the general practice of law at Columbia. He had served as Corporation Counsel under Secretary of State Walter H. Toberman (1955 - 59). A Colonel on Governor Hearnes' staff, he was also a Colonel for the late Governor James T. Blair.

A graduate of the University of Missouri School of Law, the Chairman holds a degree from the University's School of Business and Public Administration. He is a graduate of Kemper Military Academy and attended Central College, Fayette, Mo., and the University of Colorado.

An Air Force pilot during World War II, he flew 172 combat missions in the China-Burma-India theater of action. He was a jet test pilot for the Air Force from 1948 to 1953.

Chairman Clark is a member of the Executive Committee of the National Association of Regulatory Utility Commissioners. He serves on the Missouri Oil and Gas Council; the Governor's Coordinated Committee on Traffic Safety and is Chairman of the Transportation Task Group of the Missouri Emergency Resources Management Planning Board. He also serves as Chairman of an eightmember committee, The Governor's Railroad-Highway Grade Crossing Safety Committee.

A native of Missouri, Chairman Clark was born March 27, 1921.

Donal D. Guffey, a Democrat, was born April 11, 1926 in Kingston, Missouri, where he attended public schools.

He studied civil engineering in undergraduate school, attending

Park College and Northwestern University where he received his B. S. degree in 1947.

He served in the United States Navy from 1944 until 1946. He taught in the Mirabile Consolidated High School in 1948.

Commissioner Guffey was graduated from the Law School of the University of Missouri with an LL. B. degree in 1951.

Commissioner Guffey served as an Assistant Attorney General of Missouri from 1951 until 1960. In 1960 he became engaged in the general practice of law in Kansas City, Missouri, where he was associated with, and a member of the firm of Hillix, Hall, Hasburgh, Brown and Hoffhaus.

He was appointed to the Public Service Commission by

Governor John M. Dalton, and was sworn in on July 1, 1963.

He has served as a member of the National Association of Regulatory Utility Commissioners Committee on Training of Commission personnel and is presently a member of the Associations Committee on Service of Public Utilities. Commissioner Charles J. Fain was appointed to the Public Service Commission on October 1, 1965, by Governor Warren E. Hearnes for a six-year term.

A Republican from Branson, Missouri, he has practiced law since 1951 when he was admitted to the Missouri Bar, except for a threeyear period in Washington, D. C., as Assistant to the Administrator, REA. He was a partner in the firm of Fain and Rea, Attorneys at Law, Branson, Missouri, engaged in the general practice, and is a member of the Missouri Bar. Taney County Bar, the Bar Association of St. Louis and the American Bar Association.

He served two terms in the Missouri Legislature as a Representative from Taney County, serving as Speaker Pro Tem his second term. He was the author of the original Legislation creating Missouri's first Little Hoover Commission Act in the 67th General Assembly and later served as a member of that first Little Hoover Commission in Missouri. He holds an LL. B. degree from the Uni-

versity of Missouri, School of Law and a masters degree in law from George Washington University, Washington, D. C. He served as City Attorney, Branson, Missouri, for two terms and is a former president of the Branson, Missouri, Chamber of Commerce. He was a combat navigator, U.S. Air Force in World War II in the Central Pacific Theater of Action. He is now serving as Vice-Chairman of the Commission and as a NARUC Cooperator with the federal regulatory agencies.

Commissioner Marvin E. Jones was appointed to the Public Service Commission by Governor Warren E. Hearnes on April 15, 1967. His term of office continues until 1973.

A former Dexter, Missouri, attorney, Commissioner Jones was born June 8, 1921 at Bernie, Stoddard County, Mo. He was graduated from Bernie High School in 1939 and attended Southeast Missouri State College, Cape Girardeau, prior to entering the armed forces.

A World War II veteran, Commissioner Jones served as aerial navigator on B-17 Bombers with the 15th Air Force. He was awarded the Air Medal with four oak leaf clusters and the Purple Heart with two oak leaf clusters for his combat service in Italy. He was discharged in 1945 with the rank of First Lieutenant.

Commissioner Jones received his LL. B. degree from the University of Missouri School of Law in 1950 and then enrolled in that university's school of Business and Public Administration. He served as Claims Attorney for MFA In-

surance Companies and was manager of the District Claims Office at Dexter, supervising claim adjustments in the Southeastern Missouri area from 1951 until 1958. In 1958 he entered private practice of law at Dexter forming the Powell, Jones and Ringer law firm.

A past president of the Stoddard County Bar Association, Commissioner Jones was active in numerous civic affairs at Dexter. He was a member of the Board of Deacons of the First Baptist Church of Dexter and had served as its chairman. He is a Colonel on the staff of Governor Hearnes.

He is presently serving as a member of the Executive Board of the Midwest Association of Railroad and Utilities Commissioners.

Commissioner Howard Elliott, Jr. was appointed to the Public Service Commission on April 15, 1967, by Governor Warren E. Hearnes for a six-year term.

Prior to his appointment, Commissioner Elliott was engaged in the private practice of law with the firm of Boyle, Priest, Elliott & Weakley in St. Louis, Missouri. He was active in numerous civic and educational activities there including the Committee of Forty which sponsored and successfully established the St. Louis-St. Louis County Junior College District, which was the first Junior College District established in Missouri.

Commissioner Elliott was born July 4, 1933, and is the second youngest Commissioner ever appointed since the Commission's inception in 1913. He attended Brown University as an undergraduate and is a graduate of the Washington University School of Law. He served in the United States Army from 1956 until 1958.

Commissioner Elliott is a member of the Bar Association of St. Louis, the Lawyer's Association of St. Louis, the Cole County Bar, the Missouri Bar, and the American Bar Association. He is a Republican.

THE PSC IN REVIEW...

...AN HISTORY OF THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

The Missouri Public Service Commission today is a product of nearly a century of evolution. That evolution began in 1875 with the creation of the first concrete statement of the concept of governmental participation in the economic activities of the State. Missouri legislators defined governmental participation as regulation of special areas of the economy which directly influenced the health of the State's entire economic structure and the welfare of its people.

In the post-bellum years, the railroad industry was a major cornerstone in Missouri's growing economy. Because the efficiency and stability of the railroads would, in large measure, determine the economic progress of Missouri, the legislators reasoned that State government should take measures to assure the continued vibrancy of the railroad industry in order to insure the economy and at the same time to protect the public interest.



The Board of Railroad Commissioners was organized to regulate railroads operating in Missouri. The necessary legal tools for effective regulation were put at the Board's disposal. For example, witnesses could be supoenaed to appear and to testify at Board hearings. Those who neglected or refused to appear could be held in contempt by the Circuit Courts of the State. The Commissioners had access to any and all books and papers in any railroad office kept for and used by any railroad doing business in Missouri. Each year railroad companies were required to present to the Board a complete record of business activities, physical and financial assets and liabilities, and so forth. In addition to its regulatory duties, the Board investigated the safety of the railroads under its jurisdiction. It was charged with the obligation to discover safety hazards and to direct the detection of such hazards to the attention of the railroads for remedy. The Board was authorized to set a time within which repairs were to be made and hazards corrected. It could order and direct the speed of trains over dangerous and defective track until repairs were completed,

An 1889 Expansion

The Board of Railroad Commissioners experienced an expansion of its scope of activities during the next decades. In 1889, the Board of Railroad Commissioners became the Board of Railroad and Warehouse Commissioners and was given added authority to regulate and inspect Missouri's

grain warehouses. In 1893, the Board's regulatory powers were expanded to include railway express enterprises that were operating in the State.

The PSC Begins

An important development in the evolution of State Government's position in economic regulation came in 1913 when the 47th General Assembly ordered the organization of a new State agency to replace the Board of Railroad and Warehouse Commissioners. The decision of those legislators reflected an increased vision of State government and the vastrole it had to play in the continuous advance of technology and the rapid economic development that was characteristic of the Twentieth Century.

The name chosen for the new State agency... The Missouri Public Service Commission... reflects what the legislators saw as its two-fold purpose. The Commission is charged with the obligation to oversee the operation of utilities that serve the general public. At the same time, it serves the public itself by equitable regulation of industries vital to the health, comfort, and prosperity of all Missourians. Industries that, because of their vary nature, could become dangerous monopolies controlling access to water, electric power, natural gas and telephones.

Motor Carriers Added

In 1913, the Commission Act that established the Public Service Commission gave it jurisdiction over all investor-owned public utilities. It conferred upon the Commission power of regulation over not only the railroads and railway express operations but over public utilities which have grown from luxury services in the early days of the Commission to an integral part of modern living today.

The 56th General Assembly in 1931 added the motor carrier transportation in dustry to the jurisdiction of the Commission with the added provision that the Commission could levy certain feeson trucks and buses using the State's highways for transporting persons of properties for hire. The Bus and Truck Act, often referred to today as 33-D, outlines the regulation, supervision, and inspection of motorized vehicles under Commission jurisdiction.

Favorable Economic Climate

Through its regulatory powers, the Public Service Commission helps keep Missouri's public utility and transportation industries sound elements of a strong and favorable economic climate. The Commission has a responsibility both to the consumers and to the investors. To obtain authorization for operation from the Public Service Commission, as required by Missouri law, a public utility or motor carrier must show proof of financial solvency and evidence of its continued economic stability. The Commission assures Missouri citizens of safe and adequate service from public utility industries and, at the same time, protects the interests of the investors by prohibiting cutthroat, competitive practices that can destroy sound business operations.

An administrative agency of rule-making power, the Public Service Commission is bothquasi-judicial and quasi-legislative in nature. Hearings before the Commission are similar to, but generally less formal than, courtroom proceedings. The findings of the Commission are subject to

judicial review if found unreasonable or unlawful. Enforcement of Commission decisions is made by the established courts of the State of Missouri.

Commissioners' Responsibility

The final responsibility in fulfilling the Public Service Commission's obligations rests with five Commissioners, headed by the Chairman. Each of the five is appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. Each is appointed to serve a six-year term with terms of office so staggered that not more than two Commissioners' terms expire within any given year.

By tradition...but not by law...the Commissioners are selected on a bi-partisan basis. The present Commissioners represent a three-to-two majority with three from the political party in power.

Reorganized in 1966

The Public Service Commission has always sought to continue its proud history of service to citizens of Missouri. It has a long heritage of competent operation based on records of men of judgment who have served as its leaders.

In keeping with this tradition, a major change of operation has been initiated at the close of the 1966 fiscal year. New methods of operation were put into effect to enable the Commission to respond to its obligations to Missourians with greater efficiency and increased speed.

The Commission was reorganized into four major

areas: The Office of the Secretary; the Office of the General Counse); the Office of the Director of Transportation, and the Office of the Director of Utilities. Under the new system, the Commission is unified and the Commissioners better able to use its staff for the consultation needed in the complex field of regulation.

Sewer Law of 1967

On June 1, 1967, Governor Warren E. Hearnes signed Senate Bill 106 into law. The new statute renewed the regulatory powers of the Public Service Commission over privately-owned sewer utilities. Because of its emergency provisions, the law became effective immediately.

Regulatory powers over sewer companies was originally given the Commission in 1963. A declaratory judgment from the Cole County Circuit Court declared the statute which gave the Commission such jurisdiction "unconstitutional" on the grounds that it was a delegation of legislative powers without adequate standards.

The Commission did not appeal the decision. It sought to remedy the situation by legislation by the 74th General Assembly which would set adequate standards in compliance with constitutional requirements.

Included in Senate Bill 106 is a matter of general interest to all utilities operating within the State of Missouri. Section 386, 370 was amended to increase the assessment of the upper limit of the assessment of utilities for the Public Service Commission Fund from eight one-hundredths of one per cent to one-fourth of one per cent.

THE OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY...

HUB OF COMMISSION ACTIVITIES

The Public Service Commission Act provides that the five Commissioners appoint a Commission Secretary. The Secretary's duty is to keep a true and complete record of all Commission proceedings and to issue all notifications, motions, reports and orders of the Commission.

The Office of the Secretary may well be called the "hub" of the Commission. It is through this office that all the regulatory duties of the Commission begin and are concluded. The vast amount of mail directed to the Commission is sorted and distributed by the Office of the Secretary. Each item, with the exception of personally directed mail, is opened and channelled to the correct department for action.

Utility and transportation applications are received and filed by the Secretary along with annual and quarterly reports, required of companies under Public Service Commission jurisdiction. Each notice of hearing, change of hearing date, final Report and Order and the various other official documents of the Commission are signed by the Secretary. It is his responsibility to forward these official Commission communications to the parties of interest.

Keeper of the Seal

The Secretary is the keeper of the Official Seal of the Commission that is affixed to documents issued by the Commission. He is authorized to administer the Oath of Office to Commission employees. (The Oath is a pledge of support to the Constitution of the United States and to the Constitution of the State of Missouri.)

The Secretary also acts as personnel agent for the Commission. He is in charge of the handling of applications for employment, interviews of prospective employees and keeping of a complete personnel record of each employee.

Public relations are also within the scope of responsibility of the Secretary. Under his direction is the public information department through which the various news media, newspapers, television and radio stations, regularly receive releases concerning the activities of the Commission.

Vast Amount of Printing

Part of the Secretary's Office is a print shop that prepares the forms needed by the Commission. The weekly docket schedules of Commission hearings, the monthly register of motor carrier cases, the official transcripts of the cases heard by the Commission, the newly-instituted PSC REPORTS advance sheet service, the daily Reports and Orders, notices of hearing dates, changes of hearing dates, the Annual Report and other documents are printed within the Commission.

The print shopunder the supervision of the Secretary does a huge volume of printing for office use as well as the numerous reports, orders, special writs and other documents pertaining to regulatory matters. Individual departments within the Commission use many forms in performing their duties. All forms and all Commission letterhead stationary are printed within the Commission. Transcripts of cases are printed and bound in the print shop. Copies of all official documents are available at a nominal charge. These may be purchased on request to the Office of the Secretary.

A weekly docket, prepared by the Secretary, is published each Friday by the Secretary's staff. Cases to be heard are set in advance of hearing date and the Secretary sends notification of hearings at least ten days prior to the date.

The monthly Bus and Truck Registry is compiled, printed and mailed to the authorized trucking industry by the Office of the Secretary. This publication fee of \$12 is a special service of the Commission. Some 1,800 copies are distributed monthly.

Advance Sheet Service

The Commission has an Advance Sheet Service to supplement its regular publication of selected cases in bound-volume form which is required of the Commission by statute. Advance Sheets bridge the gap between editions,

The Reporter of Opinions headnotes cases for publication and digests the cases selected each month. Advance sheets are then printed in the Secretary's print shop in loose-leaf form. The Public Information Officer does a brief resume of the cases in a wrap-up sheet which also features matters of current interest written by Commissioners and staff. The bound editions are professionally printed.

The Advance Sheet service is available monthly for an annual subscription fee of \$15. There are currently 156 subscribers to this service. Most of that number are attorneys for industries under Commission jurisdiction.

It is also the duty of the Secretary and his staff to preserve a true and complete copy of all the records and proceedings of the Commission. These records are filed in their original form for five years. After five years, they are then transferred to microfilm for permanent storage.

Case Number One

The permanent records of the Commission cases are open to the interested public at any time during office hours. These records date back to April 25, 1913, when "Case No. 1" was concluded and became a matter of history.



The Commission utilizes modern office equipment to accomplish its vast clerical obligations. Shownhere is an automatic typewriter in operation.

In addition to receiving formal utility applications, the Chief Clerk audits monthly expenditures of the Commission.



The volume of mail passing in and out of the Commission office daily is tremendous. The mail clerk is shown feeding envelopes through the postal machine.

Records of all Commission cases are transferred to microfilm every five years. A member of the Secretary's staff is shown gathering information from an old case.



Setting of Hearings

The Secretary continually strives to consider all parties of interest in setting of hearing dates. In the interests of all concerned he endeavors to have the hearing date agreeable to both plaintiff and respondent to avoid unnecessary travel to Jefferson City only to find a case must be reset because a counselor is not ready to present his case or cross examine witnesses.

In many instances, the Commission has set hearings out of town rather than in its own hearing rooms at the Capital City. This is done for the convenience of parties involved in proceedings when it is deemed that a trip to Jefferson City would be a hardship to a number of witnesses. The Commission has one or more cases slated for hearing in its hearing rooms on the tenth floor of the Jefferson Building daily.

Applications Filed

The numerous regular utility cases filed with the Commission including the filing of applications for new authority or applications for Commission permission to alter operating practices, extend areas of service, curtail certain services, change rates and the various and sundry other matters of regulatory concern are handled by the Chief Clerk under the Office of the Secretary.

Motions of protest, motions of intervention, continuance of cases and the filing of briefs are portions of the responsibility delegated to the Chief Clerk. A regular resume of cases and listing of applications is compiled by the Chief Clerk and distributed to members of the Commission for their information.

During the fiscal year covered by this Annual Report, the Office of the Secretary filed 1, 404 new cases pertaining to regulation of companies under its jurisdiction. It issued and delivered to all parties of interest 6, 263 Reports and Orders. A total of 369 motions were filed and 1, 847 cases were set for hearing with 1, 303 cases heard. A total of 286 transcripts of cases were filed.





Keeps An Inventory

In addition to his other duties, the Secretary is property manager for the Commission. He maintains a complete inventory of Commission properties. The Secretary is responsible for the purchase of new supplies and equipment for all divisions of the Commission.

The secretary to the Commission Secretary is a Notary Public and is authorized to issue summons and petitions and subpoenaes when so directed by the Commission.

A staff of 16 including the necessary clerical personnel and technical assistants are assigned to the Office of the Secretary



THE OFFICE OF THE GENERAL COUNSEL...

...LEGAL ASSISTANCE IN THE INTERESTS OF ALL MISSOURIANS

The Public Service Commission Act provides that the General Counsel shall represent and appear for the Commission in actions and at proceedings involving any question under the Act or under any order or act of the Commission. He is authorized to commence action and to prosecute in the name of the State of Missouri to enforce Commission rulings or decisions.

The General Counsel also has the duty to render to the public and any municipality advice and opinions as to their rights under the Public Service Commission law and the legal methods and procedures for obtaining same. In carrying out this function, the General Counsel has instituted, in June of 1967, a written opinion system. The procedure for handling requests for opinions and advice of the General Counsel is as follows: The requests are acknowledged and assigned to one of the Assistant General Counsels or Commission Attorneys for research and preparation of a rough draft opinion. The rough draft is then reviewed by one or more Assistant General Counsels or Commission Attorneys who edit and comment in writing on the rough draft opinion. When agreement is reached between the writer and reviewers all the material is then sent to the General Counsel for approval. If he approves, the opinion is prepared in final form and sent to the one requesting the opinion. Copies are made, indexed, headnoted and filed in an opinion file so that when similar questions are raised the research and effort spent on prior requests has not been wasted. It is then only a simple matter of locating the prior opinion in the files and modifying it to meet the particular situation at hand

Legal Proceedings

Upon the filing of a case with the Secretary, the General Counsel assigns himself or one of his Assistants to the case to see that all matters are brought before the Commission and that the order of the Commission entered therein are carried out. The attorney handling the case consults with the Commission staff and interested members of the public prior to the hearing date to determine their interests so that he may represent them at the hearing before the Commission.

Any party who is in disagreement with a Commission decision may petition for a rehearing. This is the first step in a judicial review of such a decision. The Office of the General Counsel may be asked to review such petitions and advise the Commission of its recommendations as to whether or not a new hearing is to be scheduled.

Appeal to the Courts

If rehearing is denied, the party may then appeal to the courts. A member of the General Counsel's staff is assigned to analyze the legal problems involved and to prepare briefs and arguments to be presented in support of the decision.

The General Counsel, when directed by the Commission, intervenes in the name of the Commission and the State of Missouri in all court actions and at all levels when public interest is involved. He may also appear before various Federal agencies in behalf of the interests of Missouri and the Commission.

During the period covered by this annual report, the General Counsel and personnel from the Legal Department have appeared for the Commission at 16 Circuit Court hearings. The Commission has been represented by the Office of the General Counsel at four cases before the Missouri Supreme Court and Courts of Appeal. The Commission has been represented by this Office at 17 hearings before the Federal Power Commission, the Federal Communications Commission and the Interstate Commerce Commission. The Office of the General Counsel has represented the Commission at 40 Interstate Commerce Commission Joint Board hearings during the past fiscal year.

Scope of Duties

The duties of the Office of the General Counsel are vast and the demands made on this Office are increasingly pressing. Part of the added work load is due to the constant increase in the number of cases before the Commission as utility and transportation industries expand and grow in Missouri and regulatory need keeps pace with the upsurge.

Personnel in the Office of the General Counsel must have the ability to understand and analyze complicated proceedings to determine the impact on individual citizens and

companies. Such qualifications are mandatory to effectively present evidence and to facilitate the determination of a proper rate base, fair rate of return, and the feasibility of proposed projects involved in public utility operations under Commission jurisdiction. The Office also handles much of the Commission's correspondence because of the numerous legal questions involved in letters to this State agency.

Staff of Attorneys

The General Counsel has two Assistant General Counsels to assist him in the performance of his duties. One Assistant spends a majority of his time dealing with utility matters and the other specializes in transportation matters.

The Attorney-Examiners assist the Commission by acting as hearing examiners in cases before the Commission. The examiners prepare suggested reports and orders which are submitted to the Commission for consideration, editing and final decision.

The Reporter of Opinions is responsible for analyzing all reports and orders and preparing headnotes for each case published in the PSC Reports and the newly-instituted advance sheet service which supplements this publication. It is also the duty of this attorney to prepare an appropriate index for all principles of law and legal rulings involved in the published reports.

An attorney for reciprocity matters coordinates legal activities with the Office of Transportation. Changes in Missouri law have occasioned a review of all reciprocity agreements. This has resulted in modification of reciprocity policy and the cancellation of some agreements.

The necessary stenographic work for the entire legal department is performed by four legal secretaries.

Reporting Department

Also under the Office of the General Counsel is the Reporting Department. This department includes a staff responsible for the preparation of all transcripts of hearings.

During the period of this report, July 1, 1966 through June 30, 1967, the Reporting Department reported 414 cases. There were 128 cases not requiring transcripts. A total of 24, 478 master pages were transcribed by this department and 19, 150 pages of transcript were sold. A total of 846 hours was spent in the hearing room by personnel of this department.

Appointed by the Governor

The General Counsel is responsible for work assignments, schedules, personnel problems and must supervise the entire legal department. There are nine attorneys, including five hearing examiners, two assistant counsels, a Reporter of Opinions, an attorney for reciprocity matters, five court reporters and four legal secretaries in the Office of the General Counsel.

The Governor appoints the General Counsel and his assistant to the Public Service Commission.





THE OFFICE OF TRANSPORTATION...

...A VITAL REGULATORY SERVICE AFFECTING ALL MISSOURIANS

The Director of Transportation is directly responsible to the Commission for all matters relating to the regulation of motor carriers and to the rates and services of railroad companies. Matters related to safety of railroad operations, including protection of employees, are handled by the Railroad Safety Department under the supervision of the Director of Utilities.

It is the responsibility of the Director of Transportation to direct and coordinate the various activities of the Commission related to transportation, including sale of annual license stickers, maintenance of insurance records and other records pertaining to motor carrier cases, enforcement of the bus and truck law and the rules and regulations of the Commission governing the operations of motor vehicles on the highways, and the rates and services of all transportation agencies under the jurisdiction of the Commission. Responsibility in these respective areas has been assigned to an appropriate section, under the supervision of a section chief who reports to the Director. The Director is responsible to the Commission for the actions of the respective sections.

The principal duties and responsibilities of each section and a description of some of the principal projects and work performed during the period of this report are hereinafter described under appropriate section headings.

Enforcement Section

It is the responsibility of the Enforcement Section to enforce the Bus and Truck Law and rules and regulations of the Public Service Commission pertaining to motor carriers operating for-hire on the highways of Missouri.

Field personnel from this section investigate complaints against illegal operators, complaints concerning certificated carriers exceeding operating authorities and other irregularities, both economic and safety.

The field staff work closely with the certificated carriers in their respective areas in the prevention of economic or safety violations. Through this close cooperation they are able to weed out the so-called "gray area" operators.

Many times the certificated motor carrier does not realize that he is in violation. Often he does not know how to comply with the Public Service Commission requirements. A field inspector calls on the owner or operator of the vehicle. He is frequently able to prevent future violations. If this procedure fails and continued violations or failure to comply with Commission requirements are evident, a Citation Order can be issued requiring the carrier to appear before the Commission to show cause why the carrier's operation authority should not be revoked, suspended or other penalties assessed.

Field Staff Duties

Duties of the field staff are diversified, ranging from public relation contacts, investigations, equipment checks and accident investigations.

Enforcement Officers of the Public Service Commission have no power of arrest. The Missouri State Highway Patrol must make any arrest for violation of the Bus and Truck Law. A copy of each report prepared by the Missouri State Highway Patrol related to commercial motor vehicle violations or suspected violations of the law of Commission rules and regulations is forwarded to the offices of the Pub-

lic Service Commission. These reports and other written complaints received in this office from motor carriers, shippers and receivers are assigned to the field staff for further investigation.

Rigid enforcement of our regulatory requirements is probably partially responsible for a six percent increase in sale of annual license stickers over the previous fiscal year. This increase brought the total revenue for the fiscal year to \$813, 942.

Activities of Inspectors

During the fiscal year, the ten inspectors constituting the field staff made a total of 1,529 contacts of certificated carriers, checked 1,077 trucks, completed 347 investigations, worked 189 special assignments, investigated 28 accidents and drove a total of 292,303 miles in the performance of their duties.

The field staff are constantly safety checking equipment on the road and at weight stations in the promotion of safety and in cooperation with the Governor's Coordinating Committee for Traffic Safety and the Federal Highway Safety Act of 1966. These men have been trained in safety schools and are qualified to make rigid safety inspections of motor equipment to assure it is in safe operating condition.

Within the very near future this department hopes to institute an "Out of Service" program whereby any motor vehicle that is found to be unsafe to operate will be declared out of service by the field staff and the unit will not be allowed to operate until the necessary repairs are made. Defective steering, brakes, lighting and tires are the main items that

are checked in the safety inspection.

Our safety regulations are similar to the Department of Transportation, Federal Highway Administration, Motor Carrier Safety Division. This was formerly part of the Interstate Commerce Commission, Bureau of Operations and Compliance. The "Out of Service" program was originated by the Interstate Commerce Commission and has been adopted by several other states and found to be a very effective program in the promotion of safety on the highways and the elimination of unsafe motor vehicles.

In February of this year this Commission signed a cooperative agreement with the interstate Commerce Commission as provided for in Federal Law PL 89-1706 enforce state and federal economic and safety requirements. This law is to promote uniformity in the regulation of motor carriers by the various states and provides for cooperative working agreements and the interchange of information between the Interstate Commerce Commission and the other states in the enforcement of economic and safety regulations of the motor common carrier.

Since the signing of this agreement, the Enforcement Section has worked on several joint investigations with other states and in investigations which have been beneficial to both departments. The Enforcement Section works very closely with the Interstate Commerce Commission, the Department of Transportation, Motor Carrier Safety Division and the Missouri State Highway Patrol in joint road checks for violation of safety and economic regulations.

Training Programs

The Commission inaugurated a training program two years ago instructing the field staff on various phases of both state and tederal regulatory, economic and safety regulations. Since inception of this program, two such training courses have been conducted within the Commission by outside personnel of other state and federal agencies. As members of the National Conference of State Transportation

Specialists sponsored by the National Association of Railroad and Utility Commissioners, we are now participating in the conference-sponsored regional training seminars.

These seminars are conducted in two categories, one primarily devoted to economic regulations and the other to safety regulations. Members of this department participate and attend these training seminars.

The Enforcement Section's achievement goal is twofold in striving to combat illegal transportation and in the promotion of safety and better equipment on the highways in this state.

License & Records

This section is responsible for the issuance of annual license stickers and remittance of all money collected from the sale of such stickers to the State Treasurer.

Stickers which expire on January 15 of each year are issued throughout the calendar year at a fee of \$25,00 each. Replacement of a mutilated, damaged or worn license sticker is issued upon meeting three requirements:

- returning portion of the sticker on which is imprinted the serial number.
- affidavit of the lawful holder thereof, stating the facts upon which the replacement is sought.
- 3) fee of \$1,00.

This Commission has entered into reciprocal agreements with twenty-seven State Regulatory Commissions. Under these agreements motor carrier residents of the twenty-seven states are not required to purchase our P.S.C. decal if they are fully licensed in their own state. All carriers not embraced in a reciprocal agreement are required to display a P.S.C. decal on each of their vehicles operating in the State of Missouri.

A driveaway card is issued to carriers authorized to engage as a motor carrier in driveaway service at a fee of \$25,00 each.

Emergency licenses may be issued to a carrier or carriers upon request justifying an emergency demand and approval of the Commission. Driveaway cards are issued at a fee of \$5,00 each.

A total of \$813,942, an increase of 6.1% over the \$767,173 collected last year, was collected and transmitted to the Department of Revenue for credit to the Highway Fund during a period from July 1966 to June 1967. Collections by month were as follows:

All bus and truck case files are maintained by this section. Approximately 7,500 intrastate and interstate carriers have been issued certificates or permits by the Commission. A separate case file is maintained on each carrier containing applications, orders granting authority to operate in this State, general correspondence, and copies of all leases. This section also maintains files for all carriers granted authority to operate in or through Missouri by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Insurance Section

All motor carriers is sued authority by the Commission to operate motor vehicles on Missouri highways are required to file evidence of insurance for protection of the public. Common carriers authorized to engage in intrastate commerce must file with the Commission evidence of both bodily injury and property damage liability and cargo damage insurance or evidence that they are qualified to act as self insurers. Under special circumstances the Commission may waive the requirement of cargo insurance, and this is normally done only if the cargo is of relatively low value. Contract carriers engaged in intrastate commerce are required to file evidence of both liability and cargo insurance but shippers may by contract agreement waive cargo insurance requirements. It is the responsibility of the Insurance Section to see that an appropriate certificate of insurance is received for each new carrier granted operating rights and that proper insurance is maintained by all carriers.

To insure that the public will not be left unprotected, the Commission requires that insurance companies give at least 30 day's notice of cancellation of insurance. ever any such notice of cancellation is received, the Insurance Section notifies the carrier whose policy has been canceled approximately 30 days in advance that notice of cancellation of its insurance has been received and that, unless evidence of insurance coverage is received on or before the effective date of such cancellation, their operating rights will be suspended. In the event a new insurance certificate is not received by the date of cancellation, the carrier's right to operate on Missouri highways is suspended. In the event that the rights remain under suspension for more than a reasonable time, usually about six months, the carriers are directed to show cause why the operating authority should not be revoked.

Suspension of Authority

Although most carriers when advised of their insurance cancellation arrange for new coverage promptly, in the period covered by this report the Insurance Section prepared for issuance by the Commission orders suspending the operating authority of 1, 133 carriers. Ordinarily, suspension for lack of insurance does not extend over a very long period. When evidence of new insurance is filed, the suspension is vacated. During the past year the Insurance Section issued orders reinstating 728 of the suspended carriers.

The Section of Insurance works closely with the Commercial Motor Vehicle Division of the State Highway Patrol. The patrol is advised each day by telephone of the suspensions and reinstatements for use by its weight stations and field offices.

Rates & Services Section

The duties and responsibilities of the Rates and Services Section are concerned to a large extent in assisting and advising the Commission in the administration of the Missouri Statutes which govern the regulation of rates and services of railroads, street railways, express and pullman

car companies and freight and passenger motor carriers.

In conformity with the requirements of the law all such carriers must publish and file with the Commission a schedule of rates, fares and charges applicable to the service which it is authorized to perform. Each of these publications is examined by personnel of the section to determine the propriety of the schedule, whether or not it conforms to the scope of authority in the case of motor carriers and otherwise determine the reasonableness of any proposed changes in the tariff filings. In cases where it is believed that the changes should be suspended or investigated, recommendations are made to the Commission and the matter is assigned for hearing.

During the past year the section received and examined more than 7400 common carrier tariff schedules. The railroads and their tariff publishing agents filed 3267 freight rate schedules and 223 passenger fare schedules. The Railway Express Agency filed 45 express rate schedules. Freight-carrying motor common carriers or their tariff agents filed 3463 tariffs or supplements containing rate schedule changes, and motor common carriers of passengers filed 491 fare schedules. Each schedule is examined to determine if it conforms to the Statutes and affords the statutory notice of 30 days to the public and the Commission and whether or not changes that are made in the publication are reasonable and in compliance with the tariff circular requirements or other authorizations of the Commissions in orders or special authorizations. During the year ten tariff schedules were rejected for failure to give statutory notice or for other violations of tariff circular requirements.

Time Schedules Required

Motor common carriers of passengers are required to oublish and file with the Commission time schedules showing time of arrival and departure at each point authorized to be served. These schedules are received and examined by the personnel of the section to determine what changes are being made and whether or not such changes may adversely affect the traveling public. During the year 127 new or amended schedules were filed by bus operators. Time schedule changes are called to the attention of officials of the affected communities in order that they may inform the Commission if opposition may be made by the traveling public or if a hearing is desired. When protest is made it is the usual policy to suspend the proposed change pending a determination of the propriety of the proposed changes. Oftentimes, however, upon being advised by the Section of protest or opposition to a proposed change in service the carrier will withdraw the proposed change or substitute an alternate proposal to satisfy the protestant without formal proceeding by the Commission.

Railroads and motor carriers, or their tariff agents, are required to submit with each tariff filing in which changes are proposed a detailed explanation giving the reason for such change and, when it is the opinion of the section that the proposed publication may adversely affect the public interest, recommendation is made that the Commission issue an order of investigation and suspension on the proposed publication so that a determination can be made as to the reasonableness and propriety of the proposed rates or charges. During the period covered by this report live recommended investigation and suspension orders were prepared for consideration by the Commission.

A Requirement of Law

The Statutory requirements with respect to the filing of tariff schedules provide that a carrier must give the Commission and the public thirty days' notice when effecting changes in rates, fares and charges. However, the Commission may for good cause allow such changes on shorter notice or permit departure from tariff making rules. During the year the section received, examined and disposed of 113 applications for special permission to establish tariff changes on less than statutory notice or other tariff rule relief.

There has been a trend in recent years for freight-carrying contract motor carriers who operate in interstate commerce as well as in intrastate commerce to convert their operations to common carrier operations. There are at presentabout 130 contract carriers operating in the State. Each of these carriers is required by Statute to file a bi-lateral contract with each shipper for whom it has been authorized to provide transportation service. Each new or amended contract is examined by the section to determine whether or not the rates, charges or other provisions are just, reasonable and proper in accordance with the authorization of the contract carrier.

In every Order issued by the Commission granting a motor common carrier new or additional operating rights, the applicant is required to post and file rates as prescribed by the Commission or rates subject to approval by the Commission. Although such requirements are statutory, frequently through oversight or negligence of the applicant it becomes necessary to suspend an authorization for failure to file rates and charges as ordered. Such action in most instances produces the desired results and such suspensions are in most instances of short duration as the carrier is generally anxious to commence operations. During the past year ten Orders were issued of this nature.

The Rates and Services Section maintains a comprehensive record of the operating authority of every intrastate motor carrier authorized to conduct intrastate transportation within the State of Missouri. Such records are essential when applications are submitted to the Commission to grant temporary authority to fill an immediate and urgent need for motor carrier service where no other carrier service is available. All such applications are carefully reviewed and during the period covered by this report 110 recommended orders to grant or deny such temporary authority were prepared by section personnel.

The section also examined 173 applications for transfer of authorities and in each instance the records were checked and reviewed so that the authority as granted by the Commission was correctly restated in the transfer order. Applications for new or additional authority are examined in the Rates and Services Section to prepare appropriate description of authority sought for listing and publication in the Monthly Motor Carrier Register issued by the Secretary's office. During the year 130 such applications were handled and examined. The section also assists the Com-

mission's Legal Staff and Hearing Examiners by reviewing each proposed order granting new or additional intrastate authority to see that such authority is succinctly stated and is without ambiguity.

All inquiries and informal complaints concerning closing of stations, discontinuance of train service or other changes in freight or passenger train services are first referred to this section. Most of these inquiries and informal complaints can be answered or resolved informally, but some require extensive investigation by the section and formal proceedings before the Commission or by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The work of the section not only entails matters relating to intrastate carriers but also includes records, files and tariffs of interstate carriers as well. The section endeavors to keep informed as to transportation conditions

throughout the entire United States, and maintains files of interstate rail and motor carriers tariffs and statistical data from other state commissions, the Interstate Commerce Commission and various transportation agencies. Inquiries are frequently referred to this section from other divisions of the State and the tariff and statistical files of the Rates and Services Section are often useful to provide needed information.

All inquiries or informal complaints concerning ra and services are referred to the section and all such coplaints are investigated. In some instances extensive corespondence may be necessary in order to properly dispoof the matter and in some instances the personnel of the setion make personal investigations to develop information a facts to pursue the matter to a conclusion.

Motor Carrier Rates

During the period of this report, the Commission gave consideration to two applications filed for account of the property or general commodity motor common carriers for increases in rates and charges to offset operating costs. In Case T-34, 874 the Commission issued its Report and Order February 10, 1967, authorizing all intrastate motor common carriers of general commodities to increase their rates and charges approximately five percent. Such increased rates and charges were filed by the motor carriers with the Commission and became effective March 1, 1967. On May 24, 1967, the motor carriers again petitioned the Commission for a further increase in rates and charges alleging that such increases were necessary because of new wage contracts rising operating costs. The determination as to the increases sought in the latter case had not been decided by the Commission at the close of the period covered by this report.

The Commission by its Report and Order in Case T-24, 131 of March 30, 1967, authorized, but did not require, motor carriers providing intrastate transportation of uncrated household goods to establish increased rates. The Commission did not find that all motor carriers providing the service of transporting uncrated household goods should be required to establish such increased rates and many carriers have chosen to maintain previously authorized lower level of rates. In these cases the personnel of the Section assisted in determining the facts from which the Commission rendered its decision.

Increased operating costs and liberalization of parcel post restrictions are stated to be the reasons for increases proposed by the Railway Express Agency. The increased rates and charges have been filed with the Commission but are presently under investigation and have been suspended pending such investigation.

Operating costs of passenger carrying motor carriers have also risen, due principally to higher wages, and as a result thereof such carriers published a ten percent increase in their bus express rates effective March 1, 1967. Also as a result of the increase in operating costs most of the bus carriers filed a five percent increase in passenger fares with the Commission to become effective July 1, 1967, however, such increase was suspended and set for investigation.

A complete list of all intrastate motor carriers, separated as to place of domicile and by counties, showing briefly the type of service authorized to perform, has been compiled and printed through the efforts of the Section of Rates and Services and the Office of Public Information. This publication is used extensively by the personnel of the Commission as well as being made available to anyone desiring such information.

The mileage for small railroads is 2.53 miles less this year as a result of the abandonment of the Hannibal Connecting Railroad Co. approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission in Finance Docket 23, 759 and by this Commission in Case 15, 808. A new branch line of railroad by the St. Louis-San Francisco Railway Company is under construction which will ultimately be approximately 41 miles long and extends from a connection on the Salem Branch at a point near Keysville. Missouri, southeasterly in Crawford, Iron and Reynolds Counties through Bixby, Buick and West Fork, Missouri, to provide rail service for the St. Joseph Lead Company or any other public shippers or receivers of refight.

Except for a few comparatively minor changes in other than main tracks, the difference in total mileage of Class I railroads this year and that reported last year is accounted for by the abandonment of 20,75 miles of mainline track between Sedalia and Sweet Springs by the Missouri Pacific Railroad as authorized by the Interstate Commerce Commission in Finance Docket 23,470.

The following table shows the track mileage in Missouri operated by the various railroads as of December 31, 1966:



THE OFFICE OF UTILITIES...

... REGULATING SERVICES ESSENTIAL TO HEALTH AND WELFARE

The Director of Utilities is an intermediary official of the Commission. He acts in the interest of Missourians, the utilities under Public Service Commission regulation and the Commission itself. He is directly responsible to the Commission for actions of the Accounting, Engineering. Rates and Research Departments and for many activities of the Railroad Safety Department, although matters pertaining to railroad passenger fares and freight charges are handled through the Office of Transportation.

The Director of Utilities position was established to better coordinate activities of personnel involved in the procedures of utility regulation. The Director uses his judgment, which reflects the judgment of the emire Commission, to assign and evaluate areas of study with no unnecessary duplication of activity.

Department Divisions

The Chief Accountant of the Public Service Commission heads the Accounting Department and is responsible to the Director of Utilities. The Accounting Department prepares the Commission budget and keeps records of disbursements and balances of Public Service Commission appropriations. A record of the activities of that department is included in this section of the Commission's annual report.

The Chief Engineer heads the Engineering Department in a similar capacity to that of the Chief Accountant. A detailed report from that department is included in this report and may be found in this section.

Railroad Safety

The Railroad Safety Division of the Engineering Department is headed by the Bailroad Safety Supervisor, and information relating to the activities of that division will be found in the Engineering Department section of this report.

The Rates and Research Department is presently being staffed. It will be expanded to perform the following functions: Investigate and recommend rates and rules and analyze cost of telephone, electric, gas, steam heat, sewer and water utilities. It will prepare technical reports and recommendations for the examining section and the Commissioners in connection with formal utility cases. The department will handle complaints involving utility rates and rules and extension of service to prospective customers in the existing territory of utilities. The department will investigate application of utilities to extend distribution lines. It will collect, analyze and furnish information and data on the utility industry and make investigations of economic conditions affecting the utility industry. It will maintain a file of electric, telephone, gas, water and sewer utility rates in Missouri.

Complaints Handled

The handling of complaints pertaining to public utilities operating in Missouri is illustrative of how the 1966 reorganization plan will benefit Missourians and the Commission. The Director of Utilities can request the Chief Accountant or Chief Engineer to investigate all facets of the physical properties and financial structure of any utility under Public Service Commission jurisdiction.

An investor wishing to begin operations as a public utility company in the State of Missouri must meet the re-

quirements of the Public Service Commission. Those requirements, set out by Missouri law, must be met to the satisfaction of this Commission before a new company is authorized to operate. It is the duty of the Accounting and Engineering Departments to investigate, analyze and determine if Commission requirements have been completely fulfilled and to report their findings to the Commissioners.

Another area of vital concern to regulation are the original cost studies conducted by the Engineering Department. These studies are basic in determining if utility rates are just and reasonable. Original cost studies help the Commission determine fair value, which is the root of rate making.

1967 Legislation

With the 1967 passage of Senate Bill 106, the Commission was given strengthened and restated powers over sewer utility operations. The former statute in December, 1966, was deemed "unconstitutional" by a Cole County declaratory judgment.

The new sewer law became effective on June 1, 1967. Many small sewer utilities operating in new housing developments as well as larger corporations are now under Public Service Commission jurisdiction. Some sewer utilities have been operating outside the new law and are inadequate, unsafe and financially unstable. Under the new law, the Commission will take action to correct inadequacies and privately owned and operated sewer utilities will be brought within the protective cloak of state regulation.

ACCOUNTING DEPARTMENT

The Accounting Department is responsible for advising, assisting and testifying before the Commission relevant to various financial matters and the supervision of accounting matters of all utilities operating within the State.

It conducts various audits and investigations of the utilities to ascertain the facts pertinent to the utility under investigation prior to presentation of the data to the Commission for its evaluation and final decision.

There are three principal types of investigations conducted by the staff, the first being a comprehensive office audit of Annual Reports; the second, audits pertaining to rate investigations; the third, compliance audits. Along with the three main types of audits, the staff conducts special investigations as required by the Commissioners and prepares statistical studies for various Commission purposes.

The department is also responsible for the preparation of the annual budget, maintenance of current records of expenditures, and periodically advising the Commission as to the status of the various appropriations.

Securities Issued

In the fiscal year 1966-67 capital securities totaling \$394,865,000 were authorized by the Commission. This represents an increase of 22% over that of the preceding year. Of the \$394,865,000 of securities issued during the year, \$10,014,000 was for refunding outstanding indebtedness, while the remaining \$384,351,000 represented new capital securities. These new funds for construction, expansion and upgrading increased 30% over that of the preceding year.

The fact that Missouri public utilities have been able to obtain capital requirements during the past year reflects to some degree the confidence of the investors in the utilities in Missouri. In the fiscal year 1966-67 interest rates for First Mortgage Bonds and Debentures have been high, and institutional investors have imposed stringent terms and conditions on our utilities which, in the long run, will materially affect the rate payers of Missouri.

All security issues approved by the Commission have been carefully reviewed by this department. Where it was felt necessary, due to restrictive actions within the mortgage indebtedness, the department recommended to the Commission that it include in its Report and Order restrictive clauses or sections to protect the rate payers within the State.

Review of Annual Reports

The Commission receives approximately 200 Annual Reports each year from the utilities under its jurisdiction. These reports show not only the financial condition of the company, but include operating statistics useful to the Commission when rendering their decisions.

These reports are available for public inspection. The information contained therein is used extensively by security holders and investment brokers, municipal and county officials, plus any other interested persons.

The department comprehensively reviews each and every Annual Report. Where problem areas are noted, the staff communicates with the company to ascertain additional information to clarify the problems, thus attempting to perfect the report and make it more useful to its readers.

During the review of the Annual Reports the staff notes the utilities needing additional Commission assistance, and areas in which the utilities are having difficulties in completing their Annual Reports. As a result, the staff assists the utilities in correcting the various errors and informs them as to the proper steps to be taken to accurately complete the Annual Reports. The assistance is accomplished either by correspondence or, in the more serious cases, by an actual field visit by the staff.

Audits and Examinations

The personnel of the department perform their duties regarding audits and examinations both in the office and in the field. The purpose of these audits is to determine the

original cost of the property used and useful in public service, operating revenues and expenses, net operating income, and the utility's capitalization. This data is utilized by the Commission in the cases coming before it and in the exercise of its policy of continuing surveillance.

During the field work in the fiscal year 1966-67 numerous deviations were noted and exceptions were taken to the accounting distribution of specific items recorded in the books of the companies. These deviations and exceptions in most cases necessitated adjustments to the accounts.

While these audits are being performed the staff furnishes accounting guidance and assistance to the utility.

Utility Assessments

The Commission is one of the few self-supporting governmental agencies and collects the revenues with which it conducts its varied operations from the entire group of regulated utilities. The Commission is directed annually to assess each utility in accordance with the provision of Section 386,370 R.S. Mo., Supplemental 1965, as amended by Senate Bill 106, 74th General Assembly, effective June 1, 1967.

Subsequent to that directive the Commission, on June 30, 1967, entered its Order in Case No. 11,110, Supplemental Order No. 21, in which it estimated the amount of its expenses for the (iscal year 1967-68 at \$1,262,086)

At the conclusion of this fiscal year there remained in the Public Service Commission Fund \$75, 309, which has not been expended by the Commission for various reasons. This money is ratably deducted from the current year's estimated expenditures, and the utilities are subsequently assessed a sufficient amount to conduct the operations of the Commission for the ensuing fiscal year; hence, the Commission will need \$1, 186, 777 (\$1, 262, 086 - \$75, 309).

During the current fiscal year the Commission's assessments increased 135% over that of the preceding year, which was due primarily to an increase in the overall work

The cost accounting section of the department allocates the assessment to the various utilities, using as its base the prior year's gross revenues. Subsequent to the computation of the individual current year's assessments, these are presented to the Commission for approval. The department then prepares and mails the assessments.



The Director of Utilities goes over an annual report of a Missouri public utility corporation with his Chief Accountant and a member of the Accounting Department staff. Utilities are required to file annual reports with the Public Service Commission.

Authority Fees

Authority fees are assessed to the utility subsequent to the issuance of the Commission's Report and Order authorizing the utility to (saue its capital securities.

During the fiscal year utility authority and miscellaneous fees of \$84,933 and \$8,620, respectively, were collected. The collection of these fees, totaling \$93,553, in the fiscal year 1966-67 represents an increase of 2.5% and 138% over that of the fiscal years of 1965-66 and 1964-65, respectively.

All authority and miscellaneous fees are credited directly to the State General Revenue Fund.

Qualified Personnel

Current practices of the department are to employ anly professional Accountants who have obtained a college degree. There are a few individuals in the department who have not as yet obtained a college degree. They are currently attending night school at a recognized university in

an endeavor to obtain a college degree, and their experience in the field of regulations is such that they are valued members of our staff.

All members of the staff have been urged to continue their education by reading current periodicals, technical bulletins, etc., and, if they desire, to continue their college education in an endeavor to obtain the next higher degree.

General Information

During the fiscal year the Commission has maintained close contact and cooperated with Federal and other State regulatory agencies in connection with joint problems relative to the Missouri investor-owned utilities.

The department is constantly being called upon for assistance and information by those regulated, as well as the general public, and, when not in conflict with Commission policy, such assistance and information are furnished. The department works in close cooperation with other departments within the Commission, and many of the results achieved have been through the cooperation and assistance from these other departments.



The Accounting Department is charged with the responsibility of analyzing and anticipating the needs of the Commission for its proposed annual budget. The department also handles the monthly payroll. Here, Gilbert Hoffman checks the payroll with Irma Faris.

ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT

Problems coming before the Commission in connection with the regulation of electric, gas, steam heating, telegraph, telephone, water and sewer utilities, and railroad safety in the State of Missouri often require the attention of the Engineering Department. The work of this Department requires trained and experienced personnel, a number of whom are registered professional engineers. The staff receives and files tariffs of the above referred to utilities, makes original cost appraisals and related studies of the physical properties of the regulated utilities, determines and recommends depreciation accural rates, and

makes depreciation reserve requirement studies to determine if the recorded depreciation reserve is adequate.

During the period covered by this report, the following depreciation orders were written: transportation, one; telephone, fourteen; water, three; gas, three. These orders were the result of depreciation accrual rate studies. Depreciation reserve studies were made to determine if a utility's recorded depreciation reserve was adequate at the same time that original cost studies were completed. The Engineering Department staff completed six original cost studies during the report period. These included one telephone study; three water studies; and two gas studies. These studies were made to determine the original cost of utility

plant used and useful in the rendering of service to the public. This information is vital in the determination of the proper rate base for a utility.

The Engineering Department is given the responsibility for the investigation and handling of a majority of the customer complaints and inquiries regarding utility companies in the State of Missouri. This year approximately 1,600 complaints and inquiries were processed. These complaints and inquiries received by the Engineering Department may concern inadequate service, accounting or billing disputes, requests for aid in obtaining service, tariff matters, and numerous other miscellaneous subjects. Many of the complaints are resolved through communication with the company and the customer. Other complaints may require an investigation by Department personnel, and some may require final resolution by the Commission after a hearing, in which case the Engineering Department may be called on to provide expert testimony.


The Engineering Department staff devotes considerable time to conferences with officials and representatives of utility and railroad companies in order that some problems confronting them may be worked out without formal


proceedings. The staff also aids the utilities in matters which concern the filing of rates and tariffs. The Department maintains records relating to the certificated territory in which all utilities under the jurisdiction of the Commission are certificated to operate, and the rates, rules and regulations to which the operations of the utility must conform.

Engineers on the Department staff are called on to investigate major explosions if they occur in the system of a regulated utility. A report to the Commission is then made concerning the investigating engineer's findings and recommendations. During the past year the staff engineers assisted the Commission in the formulation and adoption of orders and directives which will further the safe operation of various utilities in the State of Missouri.

Several members of the Engineering Department serve on the Governor's Emergency Resources Management Plan as key operating officials. The Plan was established for the management of resources in the event of a nuclear attack or natural disaster.

The Chief Engineer participated as a conferee in the Governor's Emergency Power Conference, called to determine the possibility of a wide-spread power failure in the State of Missouri.





Missouri Electric Utilities

Growth of the electric utilities operating in the State of Missouri continued at a record pace throughout this year. Ever-increasing demands for electric energy by Missouri consumers is taxing the output capabilities of many of the electric utilities and forcing the rapid development of new generating systems to provide the additional energy required.

During this year several large-capacity generating plants have been put into service in the state, with the largest having a 525, 000 kilowatt capacity. In several instances, construction was started on additional generating plants, indicating that the demand for electric energy is expected to continue to increase in the future.


In addition to the new plants which the electric utilities are constructing, they continue in their efforts to fully utilize existing facilities by seeking to increase their load factors during off-peak periods. One of the most unique methods which has been used for this purpose in Missouri is that of the Pumped-Storage Hydro Plant. During peak demand periods, water impounded in a high elevation reservoir is channeled downward through tunnels to operate turbines

located at a lower level. The water is then impounded in a low elevation reservoir. During off-peak periods the turbines are reversed and operate as electric pumps to pump the water back up to the upper reservoir. With this system, a company may generate power during the daytime peak periods, then at night, power made available from other sources in the system because of the off-peak period, can be used to operate the turbines and pump the water back to the upper reservoir.

The increases in electric heating and all-electric homes has also aided many electric utilities in the leveling of load factors during the nor mal off-peak winter season. More complete utilization of their existing facilities has a direct influence on the over-all cost of electric energy to the consumer. This is indicated by the reduction of charges to consumers in Missouri of approximately \$674,912 by the electric distribution utilities during the year 1966-67. For this period, electric energy sold was up 11 per cent while the increase in revenues was only 8 per cent. This decrease in cost of energy trend is further supported by the fact that during the past 10 years, operating revenues have increased by 107 per cent, but Kwh of electrical energy sold has increased 134 per cent for the same period. Other statistical information for electric utilities may be found in Figure 2.

Electricity from the first 525,000 kw generating unit at Union Electric's Sioux Plant began flowing through the lines for commercial use this spring. The unit, largest in the U.E. system, brings the company's total gross generating capability to 3,150,000 kw.

Some Missouri electric utilities are faced with the problem of meeting the requirements of the Missouri Air Conservation Commission. That Commission has issued Air Quality Standards and Air Pollution Control Regulations for the St. Louis Metropolitan Area which require control of smoke dust and fly ash emissions and limit sulfur dioxide emissions.

The restrictions of sulfur dioxide go into effect on portions of one electric company's plant installations on March 24, 1970. Action has already been taken to begin installation of devices which will restrict the emission of sulfur dioxide to acceptable standards.

The Federal Government has intervened in the formulation of regulations for the Kansas City area and these regulations will be subject to review and approval by the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare.

The use of nuclear energy in future power generating plants is a possible solution to the problem of air pollution for electric utilities. Though consideration has been given to nuclear powered generating plants in the State of Missouri, the feasibility of such a project has not yet been proven.

Action taken by the electric utilities to correct deficiencies discovered during the Governor's Emergency Power Conference helped to minimize the effects of the prolonged and extensive heat wave which engulfed the midwest during the month of July, 1966.

Missouri Gas Utilities

Natural gas distribution facilities in Missouri have experienced rapid growth during recent years. The trend toward suburban living has made the provision of natural gas feasible in many previously unserved areas. This, combined with the provision of gas to cities and towns without natural gas facilities, has accounted for most of the new growth. Most companies have also expanded existing facilities in the areas in which they are certificated to serve.

Securing sufficient amounts of natural gas for Missouri consumers during peak demand periods has long been a problem in the state. The primary sources of supply for natural gas consumed in Missouri are interstate transmission line companies, whose lines extend from natural gas fields located in states to the south and west of Missouri. Allocations of additional natural gas from the transmission line companies are under the jurisdiction of the Federal Power Commission. Several major distribution system expansion projects are awaiting Federal Power Commission rulings.

Peak demands for natural gas during the winter heating season has created problems for many natural gas utilities. These peak demands increase the over-all cost of gas purchased from the pipeline companies, and most utilities are making a concerted effort to increase usage during off-peak periods to level their over-all load factor. Some companies are also attempting to minimize the effects of peak demands by supplementing their gas supplies with liquified petroleum gas during these periods. This poses some problems because of the difference in heat content between liquified petroleum gas and natural gas. Change by some utilities from the cubic foot method to the "therm" method of billing, which accounts for the difference in heat content of the gas, has virtually eliminated the related problems.

One Missouri gas utility has partially alleviated its gas peak demand problem by successfully establishing an underground storage facility. This makes possible the storage of gas during the off-peak, non-heating season, which may then be used during winterpeak demand periods. This helps to level the company's load factor and thereby decreases the over-all purchase cost of the gas, which in turn creates a savings for the consumer.

One of the new developments for natural gas utilities in Missouri is the "total energy" concept. Through this concept, water and space heating, lighting and air conditioning are all provided by the natural gas total energy system. In the operation of this system, natural gas engines drive generators to produce electricity, while exhaust heat from the engines is recovered to provide heat, hot water and air conditioning to the building. Two of our major Missouri cities now have total energy installations in operation. In Kansas City, the Archbishop O'Hara Memorial High School, enclosing 121,000 square feet of floor area, is operated by total gas energy. The newest total energy installation in the state is in the Council Plaza complex in St. Louis, Missouri, This complex consists of two 300 unit high-rise apartment buildings, a two-story commercial center, a 100 bed nursing home, an automotive center, and the power plant. When operating at maximum capacity, the total energy plant in this complex will consume 25, 800 cubic feet of gas per hour.

The primary feature of total energy plants, as concerns the gas utilities, is that they operate at a near constant load factor throughout the entire year, thereby eliminating large increases in the demands for natural gas during peak periods.

Among new developments in the gas industry is the outside reading extension for gas meters. Through an electronic device, a reading of gas meters installed inside a building may be obtained from the outside. Various types of devices are presently installed throughout the state on a test basis. If these devices prove to be successful, they should greatly aid in the efficiency of meter reading and in the decrease of complaints due to estimated meter readings caused by the limited access to the meter.

Though the costs of providing service continue to rise, the gas utilities through load factor leveling and economy of operation, strive to prevent increases to the consumer. The following ten year statistics show some of the effects of these efforts.

From the year 1957 to the year 1967, Mcf of gas sold increased by 271 per cent. Income from gas sales increased 166 per cent. Investment in plant-in-service increased 151 per cent and the number of consumers increased by 96 per cent. Other gas statistics are shown by the graphs and tables in Figure 3 and Figure 4.



Missouri Water Utilities

Urban development, the trend toward large suburban residential treas, and the increasing development of recreational and retirement facilities have greatly increased safe water supply demands in the State of Missouri. Numerous rivers and streams throughout the State are the primary source of safe water for both industrial and domestic use. Drilled wells also provide potable water for many Missouri citizens.

The regulation of water utilities has been complicated by the construction of a number of small water companies throughout the state who fail to report their operations to the Commission. Often these serve a small number of customers and the operators may be unaware that they are under the jurisdiction of the Commission. Close coordination with the State Division of Health has aided in determining the existence of some of these new water systems. Once the operation of a water system is disclosed, action is taken to determine if the system is operating as a public utility. If so, steps are taken to bring the utility under active regulation by the Commission.

3 New Companies

During the year 1966, there have been three new companies certificated to operate as public utilities, and three companies have been granted permission to sell their properties to a water district and discontinue their operations. Even though the number of companies under Commission jurisdiction did not increase, there was an increase in the number of customers served by water utilities, the result of growth within areas already certificated. The charts


in Figures 5 and 6 depict the general increase in the water utilities. The drop in the year 1958 is primarily due to the sale of a certificated water company to the city in which it was located and to above average precipitation which occurred generally throughout the state in that year.


Three steam heating plants in Missouri continue without much change. These systems are used to supply steam for space heating in those areas in which there is a concentration of stores and offices in our larger cities. The introduction of natural gas into our cities has decreased the demand for steam heat in recent years.

Sewer Utilities


The statute which placed sewage disposal systems under the jurisdiction of the Commission was ruled unconstitutional in a decision handed down by the Cole County Circuit Court in the latter part of 1966. A new statute, included in Senate Bill No. 106, was enacted by the 74th General Assembly. This statute became effective upon being signed by the Governor on June 1, 1967, and investor owned sewer systems serving 25 or more service outlets, for gain, were again brought under Commission jurisdiction.

Plans are being implemented which will bring all qualifying sewer companies operating as public utilities in the State of Missouri under active jurisdiction of the Commission in accordance with Senate Bill 106. Each of these sewer utilities will be required to file an application with the Commission for a certificate of convenience and necessity for the area in which they wish to operate.

Telephone Utilities

This year, a significant milestone was reached by the telephone industry in America--installation of the 100 millionth telephone. This milestone was reached just 91 years from the installation of the first telephone in America, in the laboratory of Alexander Graham Bell.

Growth of the U. S. telephone industry has been increasing rapidly in recent years. It took the industry 77 years to reach its 50 millionth telephone installation, but only 14 years to double it. Growth of the telephone industry in Missouri has also been impressive. During the last 10 years the number of telephones in service in the state has increased by 55 per cent, to a total of 2,348,271 telephones as of June 30, 1967. Other pertinent data regarding the telephone industry in Missouri is shown on the chart in Figure 7.

Plant Investments

With the rapid growth in the number of telephones in service is associated a proportionate increase in the amount invested in the telephone plant. A total of \$128.7 million was spent on construction in Missouri during 1966 and a record of \$133.3 million is budgeted for construction in 1967. New telephone buildings and additions and installations of new central office equipment have been provided by these expenditures to help the telephone industry keep pace with Missouri's exonomic growth and the demands of the citizens of the state for the most modern telephone facilities available.

A sizeable portion of the industry's construction budget will go toward implementing the wide-area service plan approved by the Commission for the St. Louis and Kansas City metropolitan areas. These service plans, when introduced late in 1968, will eliminate a majority of the existing inter-zone toll charges within these metropolitan areas.

Significant technological advances in the telephone industry marked the expansion of service to Missouri consumers during the pastyear. One of the important develop-

ments related to private line networks between various educational institutions. The private line networks simultaneously link together classrooms in the network.

In Barry County in southwest Missouri, three telephone companies joined together to provide a private line network for six high schools. This network, which links together electro-writer equipment with two-way voice circuits, permits one teacher to conduct classes in all six county high schools at the same time. The electro-writer projects notes which are written by the teacher on the wall of the linked classrooms in the network at all the receiving locations.

1967 Legislation

Great progress was made this year in the crackdown on annoying and anonymous telephone calls. Legislation in the form of Senate Bill No. 79 was enacted by the 74th Missouri General Assembly, making the use of telephone service or the completion of telephone calls for annoyance, lewd or harrassment purposes a misdemeanor. This law, combined with the cooperation of law enforcement agencies and the telephone industry, should be extremely helpful in combating these undesirable uses of telephone service.

Among other notable developments this year was the installation of a special defense telephone system to serve federal agencies. The system is built around a large centrex, providing a centralized communication center second only to the Pentagon communication system in size and complexity.

This year the demand for telephone facilities created a challenge for the telephone industry in Missouri, and there appears to be no let-up in sight to this demand for modern telephone facilities. The increase in telephone facilities in the State of Missouri in recent years is indicated by the graph in Figure 8.





Western Union

Western Union is perhaps the oldest communications utility in the state. In recent years, Western Union has undergone many changes and as a result many new services have been offered to the public, largely on an interstate basis. Most of the regulations governing the company's activities are under Federal Communications Commission jurisdiction, but there still are many problems involved in intrastate matters.

The Company's modernization and expansion or ogram has, for some years, required large amounts of capital. Much of the new capital has gone into expansion of the AUTODIN System (serving the Department of Defense), the continuing expansion of Telex, and the further development of Broadband Exchange Service.

Telex is a customer-to-customer teleprinter exchange service. A subscriber can diala direct connection to another subscriber for the transmission of typed messages or data in the form of perforated tape. The number of Telex subscribers in the United States reached 20, 700 at mid-year, as against 15, 750 the previous year. Telex revenues have now reached an annual rate of more than \$32 million.

Hot/Line, Western Union's new private, point-topoint telephone service was inaugurated during the past year. This system features automatic connections, with no dialing and no minimum time charge, and provides a fast and economical service for firms having a frequent requirement for voice communication between offices in two distant cities.

Western Union's nationwide network is being modernized with computers having multiple access capabilities, enabling the company to offer services permitting many firms to share the network at charges determined, basically, by how much of the system's capacity each customer uses. INFO-COM is a shared-service communication system now in experimental operation and scheduled for regular operation early in 1968.

Though revenues for message services (Telegraph) were down \$453,774 for the six months ended June 30, 1967, as compared to a corresponding period the previous year, revenues for Telex were up \$3, 141,985 for the same period. These figures indicate that while telegraphic wire services as such are gradually being discontinued with the closing of smaller offices, the development of other communications systems and services has already contributed substantially to revenues and service to the public. Diversification into other aspects of the telegraphic field have helped Western Union retain its stature in the field of communications utilities.



Railroad Safety Division

The primary concern of the Railroad Safety Division of the Engineering Department is the safe operation of railroads throughout the State of Missouri. To help to insure the safe operation, personnel of the division spend a great deal of time inspecting railroad equipment, tracks, railroad crossings, guard rails, and sub-standard clearances. Attention is also given to personal safety of railroad employees. Inspection of shelter houses, yard offices, sanitation facilities, locker rooms, and work areas has proved beneficial in this respect.

Deficiencies in a railroad operation which might be detrimental to safety and in violation of the Commission's safety code are reported to the Commission by the Railroad Safety Division personnel. In most instances, the deficiencies are corrected through correspondence with officials of the companies.

When, after notification, a deficiency is not corrected voluntarily by the railroad company, the matter is brought before the Commission with recommendations from the Engineering Department and the Railroad Safety Division. If the Commission finds, after hearing, that its safety regulations have been violated, it may order the company to correct the condition and direct its General Counsel to seek statutory penalties in the Civil courts.

Accident Investigation

An important phase of the Railroad Safety Division's activities is the investigation of any railroad accident from which personal injury or death results. Upon receiving the report of such an accident, the supervisor or a field investigator inspects the scene of the accident to determine if the Commission's safety requirements were violated.

Hazardous conditions caused by careless loading operations, weeds and debris which might block vision at crossings, faulty or inoperative warning signals and substandard clearances are safety items for which the Railroad

Safety Division personnel must always be alert. These conditions are recorded, often by photograph, and are then reported to the Commission. These records and reports are often helpful in the event a hearing is called for the purpose of correcting a deficiency pertaining to railroad safety.

Govenor's Committee

Because of his concern over the increase in the number of grade crossing accidents, Governor Warren E. Hearnes, in 1966, named a special committeeto investigate the upsurge in grade crossing accidents and recommend measures designed to reduce these accidents. Public Service Commission Chairman William R. Clark was designated chairman of the committee, and the Governor requested the Public Service Commission and its staff assist the committee, in its investigations.

This year, upon the recommendation of the Governor's Railroad-Highway Grade Crossing Committee, three sets of grade crossing warning signals were designed and installed at crossings considered to be dangerous. These caution signals are a standard railroad cross buck with a 12 inch flashing yellow beacon placed above and below the cross buck. One signal is installed on each side of the crossing and the alternately flashing lights operate continuously.

Observation of these warning signals in use indicates that they affect the manner of approach to the crossing of a majority of the motorists. Most motorists have slowed their vehicles and crossed the tracks with caution. These warning signals are less expensive than flashing lights and if they prove to be effective they should be a big factor in safety at crossings which are not heavily traveled.

Safety Installations

Other safety equipment installed during the year included flood lights to light dangerous crossings and a hand operating signal which operates much like a regular street traffic signal. During this year the Public Service Commission also approved the installation of 13 flashing light railroad signals.

This year the Commission issued General Order No. 47, which requires all railroads to maintain the right-of-way at public grade crossings so that it will be reasonably clear of vegetation, undergrowth or other debris for a distance of 250 feet each way from such crossing where the vegetation or undergrowth would materially obscure approaching trains from the view of travelers on the highway.



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
