

WILL NOT BE CONVENED IN EXTRA SESSION ON UNITED STATES ELECTION LAW.

THE PRIMARY LAW SUFFICIENT

Governor Major Gives Statement Meeting Present Primary Law Covers the Situation—Quotes the Law.

Governor Major today gave out a statement in which he said the present primary law was sufficient to cover the situation of electing United States Senators by direct vote of the people. He said: "I have had but very little time to consider the question in reference to the amendment to the federal constitution now requiring the electors of United States senators to be elected by the people. I am of the opinion, however, that the present state primary law is ample and sufficient to cover the situation, and that the only amendments for United States senators must be made at the state primary in August. The state primary law, section 5852, R. S. Mo., 1908, provides as follows: "Whenever all candidates for elective offices shall be nominated by the primary election held in accordance with this article, etc." "As the United States senators are now to be elected by the people, and not only meet the conditions at the time of the amendment, but also conditions which might hereafter arise in reference to the subject matter. Therefore, there is no occasion for any extra legislation upon the subject. The present law is ample."

ATKINSON, KEYSER, WIGHTMAN AND SHAW APPOINTED AS COMMISSIONERS.

F. W. LEHMANN MAY BE FIFTH

Gov. Major Disregards Politics and Selected Two Republicans—John A. Kasst Gets Coal Oil Inspectorship.

Four members of the new Public Utilities commission were named by Gov. Major. They are: John Atkinson of Doniphan, Riley county, Mo., who was formerly assistant attorney general, and who during the session of the legislature acted as public secretary to the Governor; Judge John Keast of Kansas City, formerly Republican member of the Supreme Court; Frank A. Werhman of Missouri, a member of the present Board of Railroad Commissioners, who passed out of election Tuesday; and H. Shaw of Delaware, dean of the School of Engineering, professor of electrical engineering and director of the engineering department of the University of the Missouri State University.






Empire District Electric crews, 1929










Inside the control room, KCP&L power plants.














Judge E. L. McClintock, affectionately called the Dean of the Public Service Commission, has served as a Commissioner longer than any other person since the creation of the Public Service Commission in 1913. Judge McClintock was appointed as a member of the Commission on May 15, 1945, by the late Governor Phil M. Donnelly for an unexpired term of four years and was reappointed in 1949, 1955 and 1961. He has served under five Governors.

Judge McClintock has spent more than 50 years in the courts of Missouri. A portion of that time he was an official court reporter. A member of the Missouri Bar Association, Judge McClintock in 1965 was given the honorary title of Senior Counselor

Judge McClintock's term of office will expire in April, 1967.


